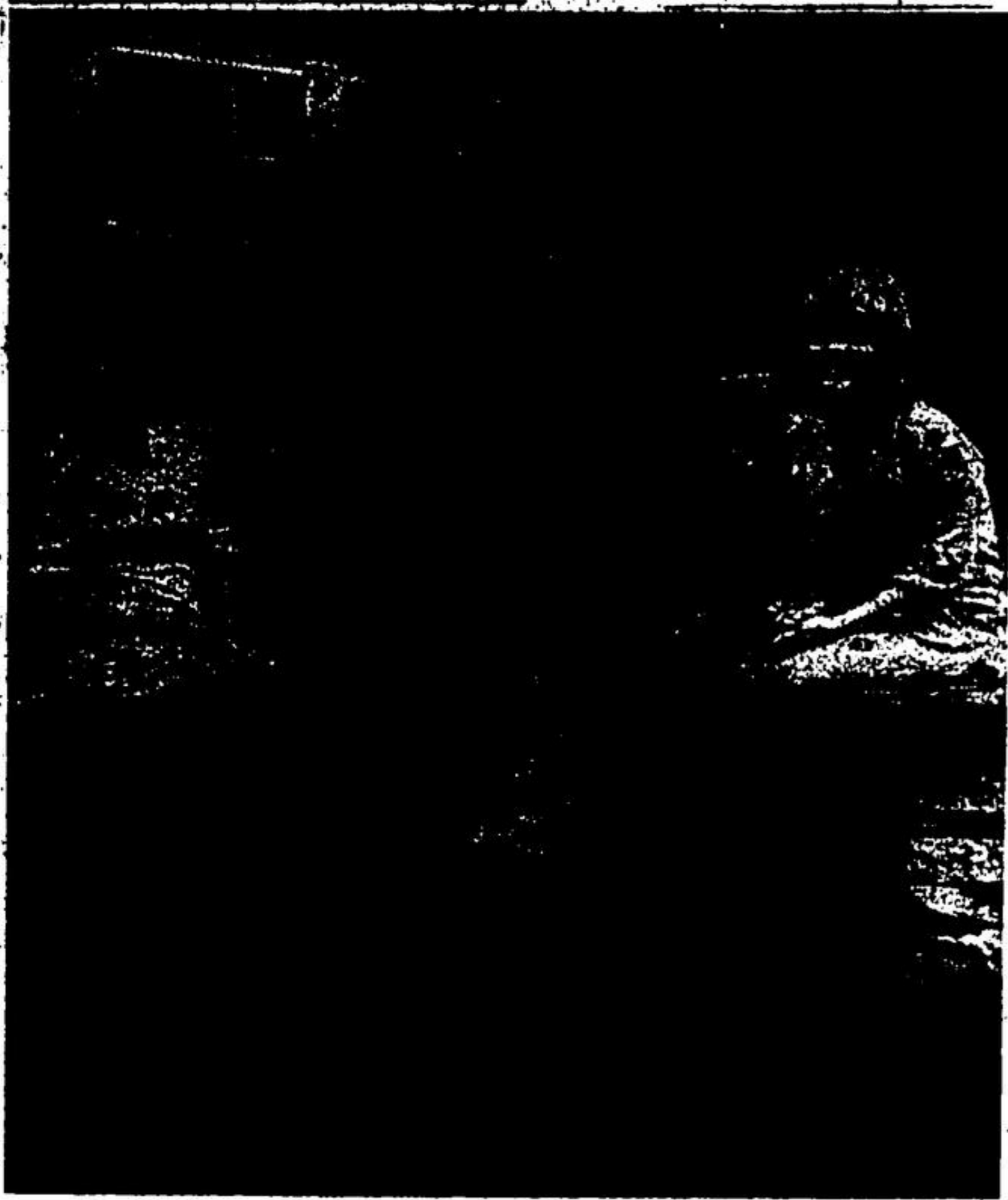


LEADERS VOTE CHASING

Says Revenue Insufficient To Support Milton Radio

Oakville radio station CHWO vigorously opposed a bid to open a new radio station -- T8 be called CHBM -- in Milton when the application went to the Canadian Radio Television Commission in Ottawa last Tuesday.

Loren James Cassina of London, Ernest Honnessey and William Logan of Burlington made the application for a 24 hours a day station at 960 k.c.k. to be located in Milton and serve Halton County. They said a needs study showed there was sufficient revenue for the station to show a profit in the first year of operation.

Mrs. Joan E. Cairpe, president of CHWO, maintained there is not enough revenue for a station to survive in Milton. She said one year CHWO had a full time salesman in Milton and he sold \$5,200 worth of advertising -- not enough to pay his salary or keep the radio station operating for one day a month. She noted this area can receive 37 radio and six TV stations clearly, and another station was not necessary.

Milton council had earlier decided to support the station bid. Mayor Brian Iles, Reeve AUSTAN, Ledwith and Deputy Reeve Ron Harris travelled to Ottawa and all three spoke in favour of the application. Mr. Harris produced letters of support from Halton EMO, Milton Fire Area Commission, Milton Police Department, and Milton Chamber of Commerce.

It is understood that CHIC radio station, Brampton, entered a brief in opposition to the application. No one attended from CHIC but the Commission had advertised that it would accept written briefs in support or opposition.

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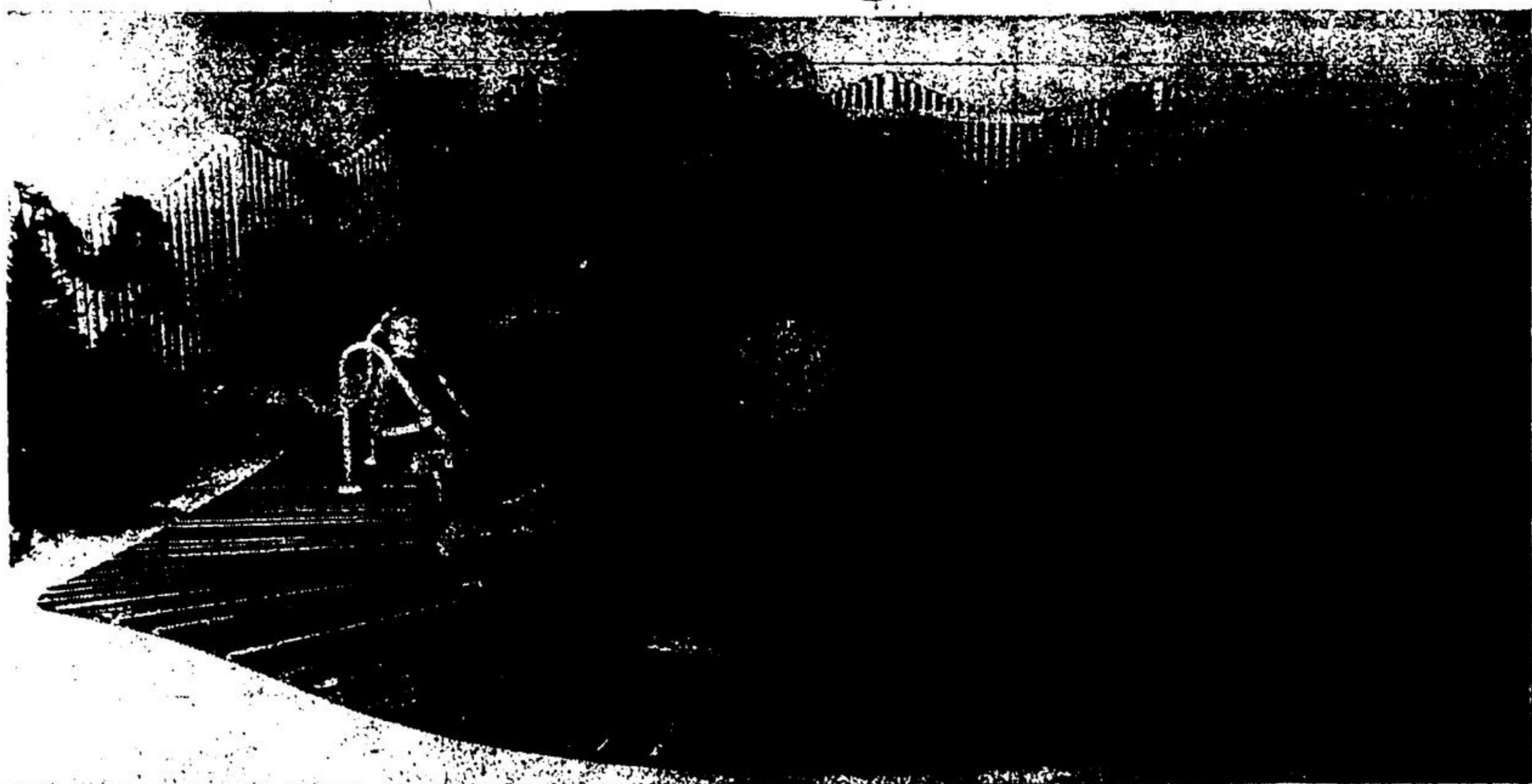
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
