

LET'S PLAY BRIDGE

When one of my members of my recent bridge class makes a play that would do credit to an expert, I feel it's worth writing about.

I had read about this play in a bridge book by Reese but I had never seen it used until recently. The members of the class were replaying some hands from the regular duplicate game at the Acton Bridge Club.

This deal came up. North - South vulnerable and West was the dealer.

NORTH
S-J 6
H-A 7 4 3
D-10 2
C-AK Q 7 6

WEST
C-10 8 3
H-Q J 9 5 3
D-8 8 5
C-J 10

EAST
S-A K Q 7 3
H-K 10 6
D-A 4
C-9 5 2

SOUTH
S-9 5 4
H-8
D-K Q J 7 5 3
C-5 4 3

The bidding:
WEST NORTH EAST SOUTH
Pass 1 C DBLE 2 D
Pass 3 H 2 S 3 D
Pass Pass Pass

Opening — ten of spades.

East won the opening lead with the queen of spades. What would you do in East's position?

Here is the problem. You want to stop South from ruffing the third spade in dummy. Hence you would like to draw dummy's trump. If you draw dummy's trump, however, you give the timing to declarer who can now draw all the trump and run dummy's clubs. How can you accomplish what you want without giving up control?

This is where East made the

experts play. The four of diamonds was led and declarer could not escape.

If declarer tried to run clubs, West could ruff. If declarer led a spade, East would win and take out trump and finally if declarer continued trump, East could win and take two spade tricks.

When the hand was played in regular competition at the Acton Bridge Club no South made less than ten tricks. With the defense put up by East as described above, declarer was held to nine tricks only, South made the contract but remember at duplicate, over-tricks are vital.

Some day you may face a hand where the contract, not over-tricks is at stake. Remember this low lead from the trump ace as a method of keeping control. It could be useful.

He said he picked up the first youth, who was hitch hiking, and went to a garage in Georgetown for a coke. He said he sat in the car when his friend tried open the machine, after getting nothing from it, and was not a party to the offense.

The pair were apprehended by a Georgetown policeman who spotted them breaking in to the car wash coin machine.
