Last Wednesday, the members competed for the Fred Gilmore memorial dart trophy. The winners this year were Harry Bottoms and Ken DeRose.

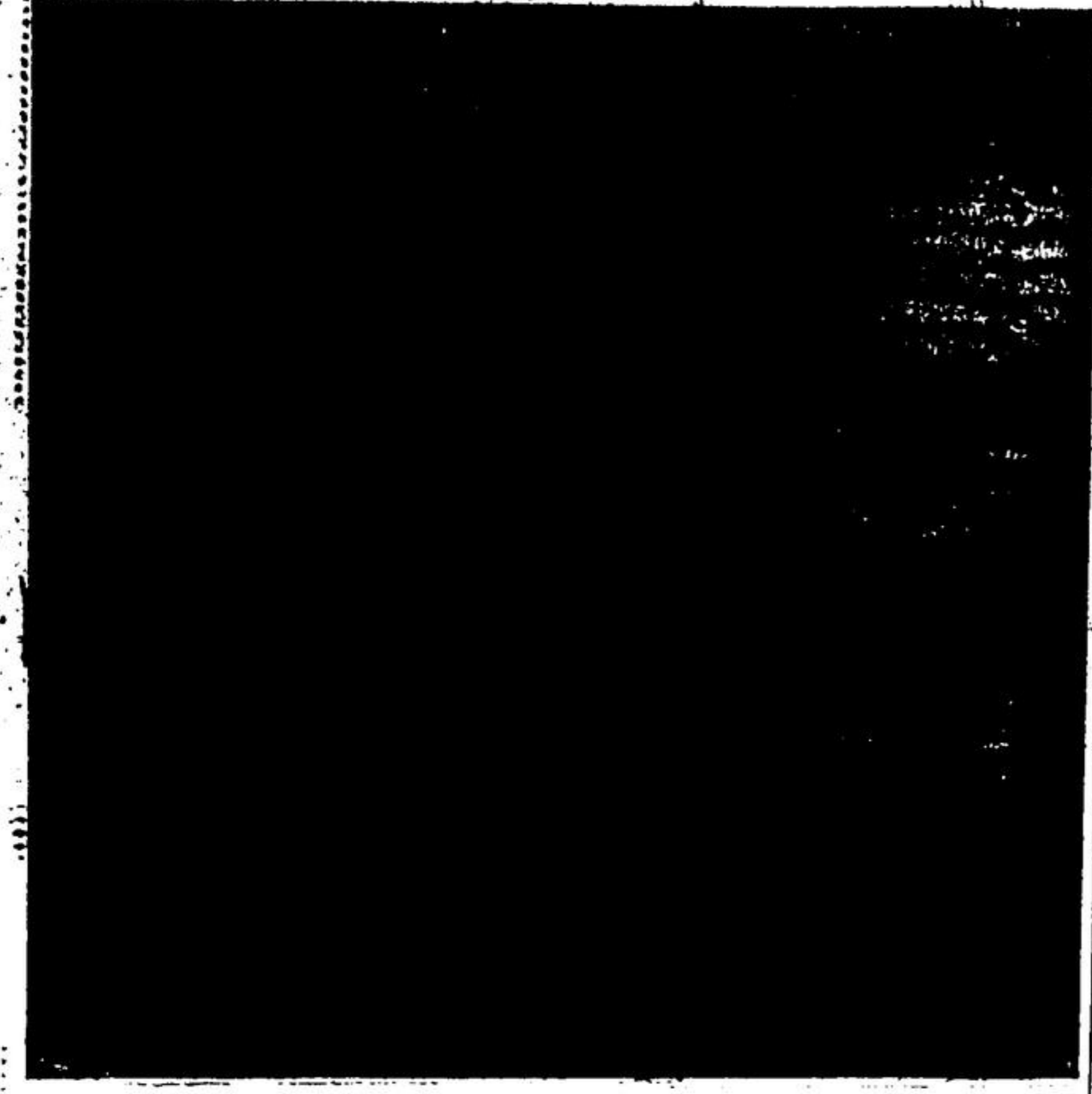
