Overspent, Tell Authority Must Conserve Money Now

Haltion Region Conservation Authority overspent its 1967 budget by \$43,827 an audit revealed this week.

As a result the authority has been told to restrict its spending on conservation projects in 1968.

The deficit was revealed in the 1967 audit by chartered accountant Gordon Glenn who suggested the authority in future come up with regular monthly statements of income and expenditure so everyone would know where the authority was headed.

Glenn said the main reason for the deficit was that "just about every possible unfavourable variation in the 'budget' had occurred."

Most of the extra cash spent was on area operations, salary hikes and hiring more staff "there were further expenditures which were not at all contemplated." He cited a security patrol as one.

Last year the authority spent \$247,878 on six conservation areas. The largest single item was of over \$81,000 at Rattlesnake Point.

Another \$87,867 was spent on land purchases and a further \$5,848 on construction and development.

SERMON - "FAITH TOWARDS GOD"

Says Council Negotiators Adequate For Expropriation

Dear Sir:
As an owner of a home slated for expropriation, I felt it necessary to attend council meetings during the last number of weeks.

The necessity, of course, is putting on some pressure to effect settlement without endless delays. After all these weeks, no progress has been made and one tends to question, how come?

After observing council for the last five meetings, I came to the conclusion that we have a reeve, deputy reeve and councillors who are dedicated to their job. The workload that each member has to carry is considerable and I cannot help but respect them.

Then there is our mayor, whose main interest seems to be to oppose each council member to the best of his ability. This has been clearly demonstrated in the last two weeks. Last week, when the budget was passed, the mayor, who is a member of the police committee, which was responsible for two-thirds of the increase in taxes, had to oppose the budget because of what he called "loose spending" of other councillors.

At this week's meeting the mayor saw fit to kill a motion that would have been the logical solution to effect settlement re our homes.

Some weeks ago council appointed a committee out of council to deal with the property owners involved in expropriation. The same week the mayor saw fit to write to the property owner, disclosing the value of one's property to all his neighbours. This being an invasion of privacy and meddling in the appointed committee's business, the committee resigned.

Last week council decided to appoint an outside real estate firm to do negotiations for them. At this week's meeting, most people involved requested council to change this stand for the following reasons: (1) the time delay was too long (2) The cost involved was a needless waste of taxpayers' money, as this matter could be settled just as well by council members.

Council was willing to change its stand and a motion was moved to appoint a new committee out of council. The appointees pointed out that they only could serve if the mayor would abstain from further meddling. Over angry protests of council, the mayor stated that he had no intention of doing so. The motion, therefore, was lost and we are in the same boat as before.

It has become clear to me that a mayor who serves with only to boost his own ego and misuse his powers, may turn out to be a very poor bargain. It is tragic that the work of council members is constantly hampered by someone whose only interest is not the town, or the citizens of the town but only himself.
