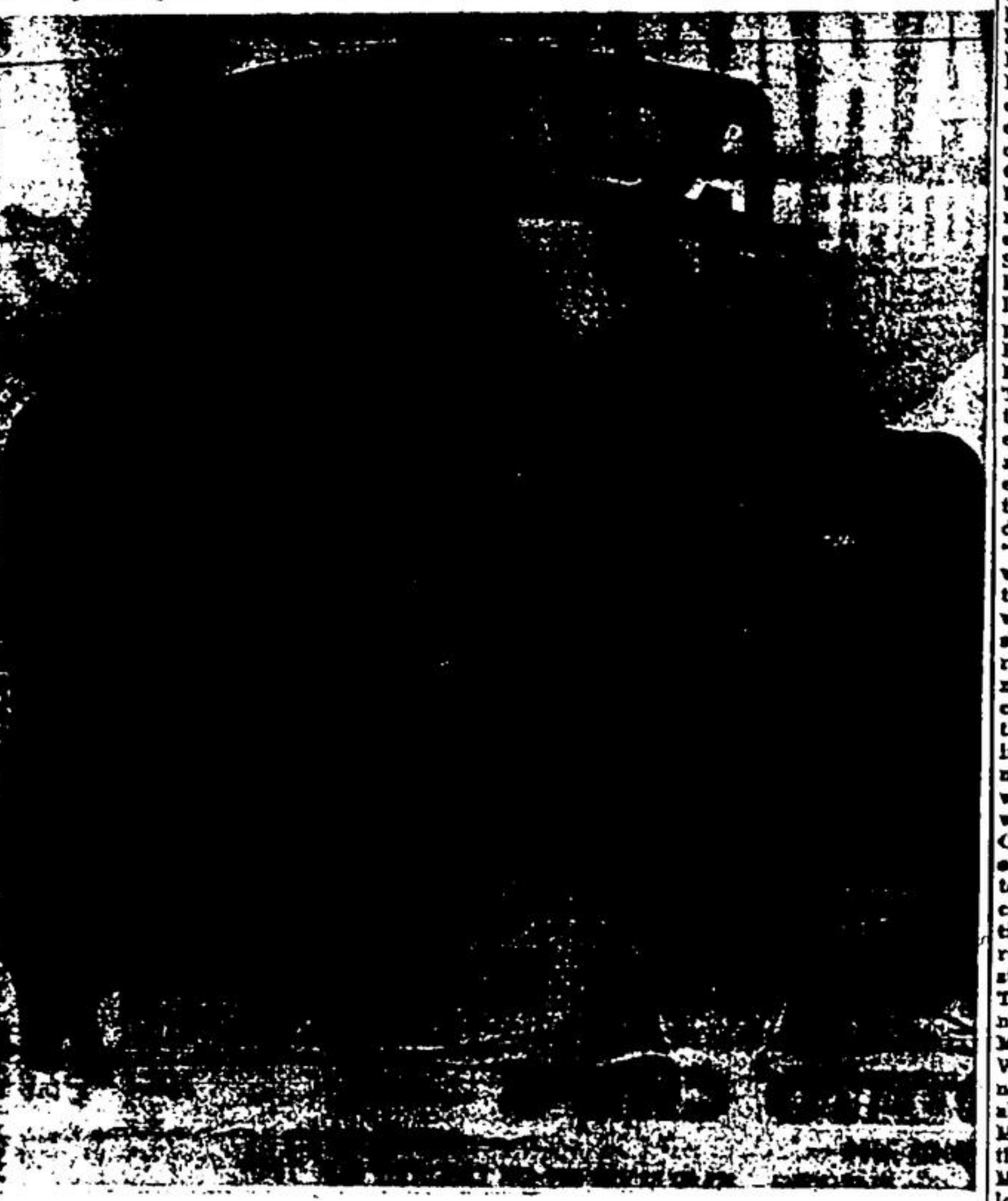
A highlight of the afternoon was an address by guest speaker Professor John Wilson of

Waterloo University, a CBC consultant on confederation. His speech paralleled the theme of the convention, "Brotherhood Today is the Key to Tomorrow."

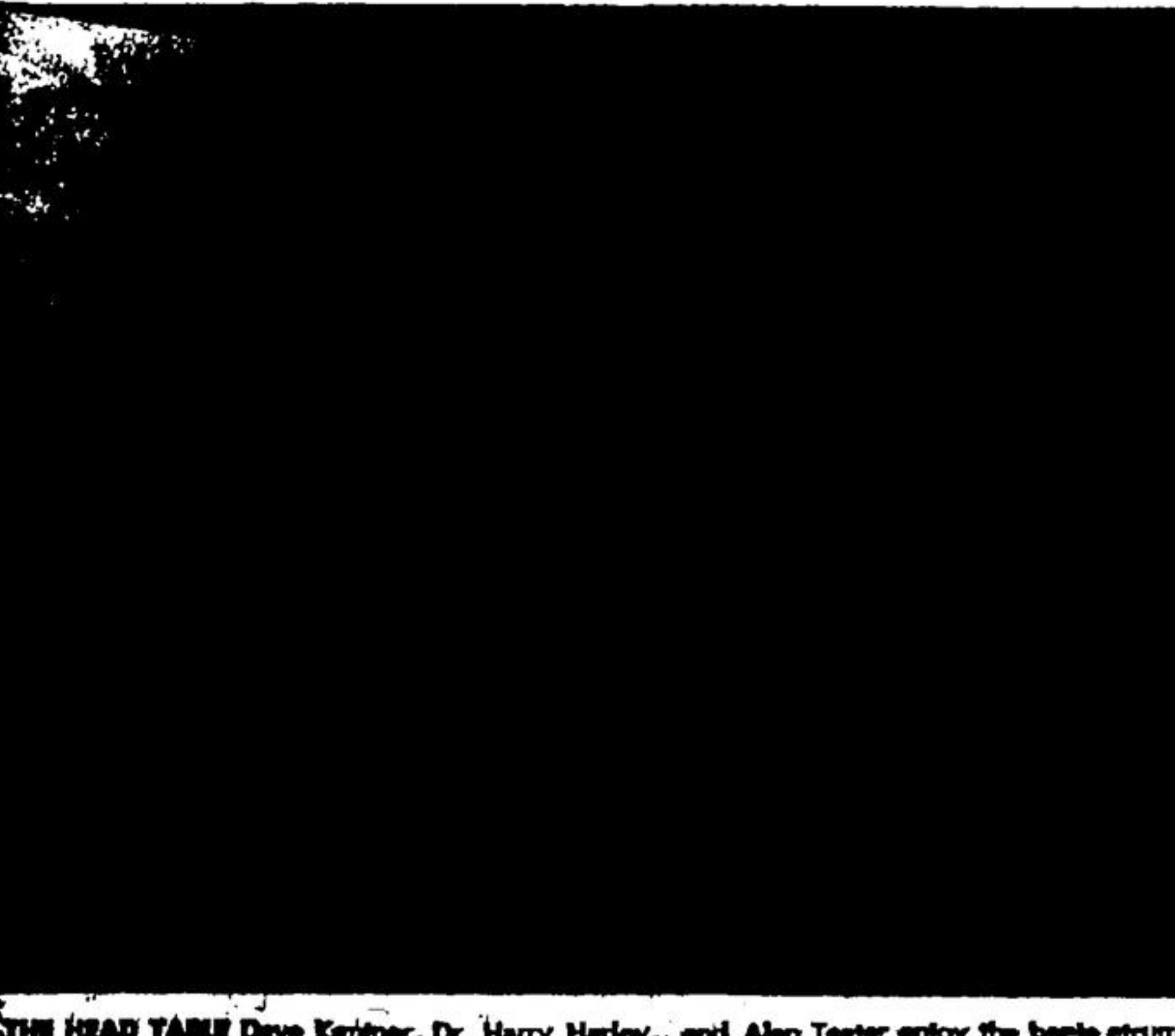
The academy award winning Canadian film, A Place to Stand was also a convention highlight.

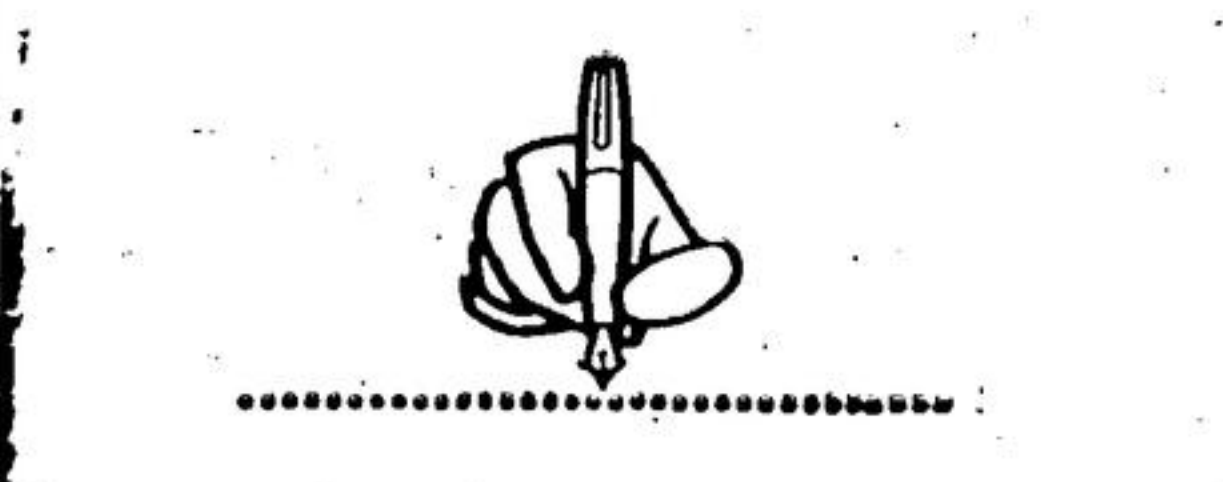
