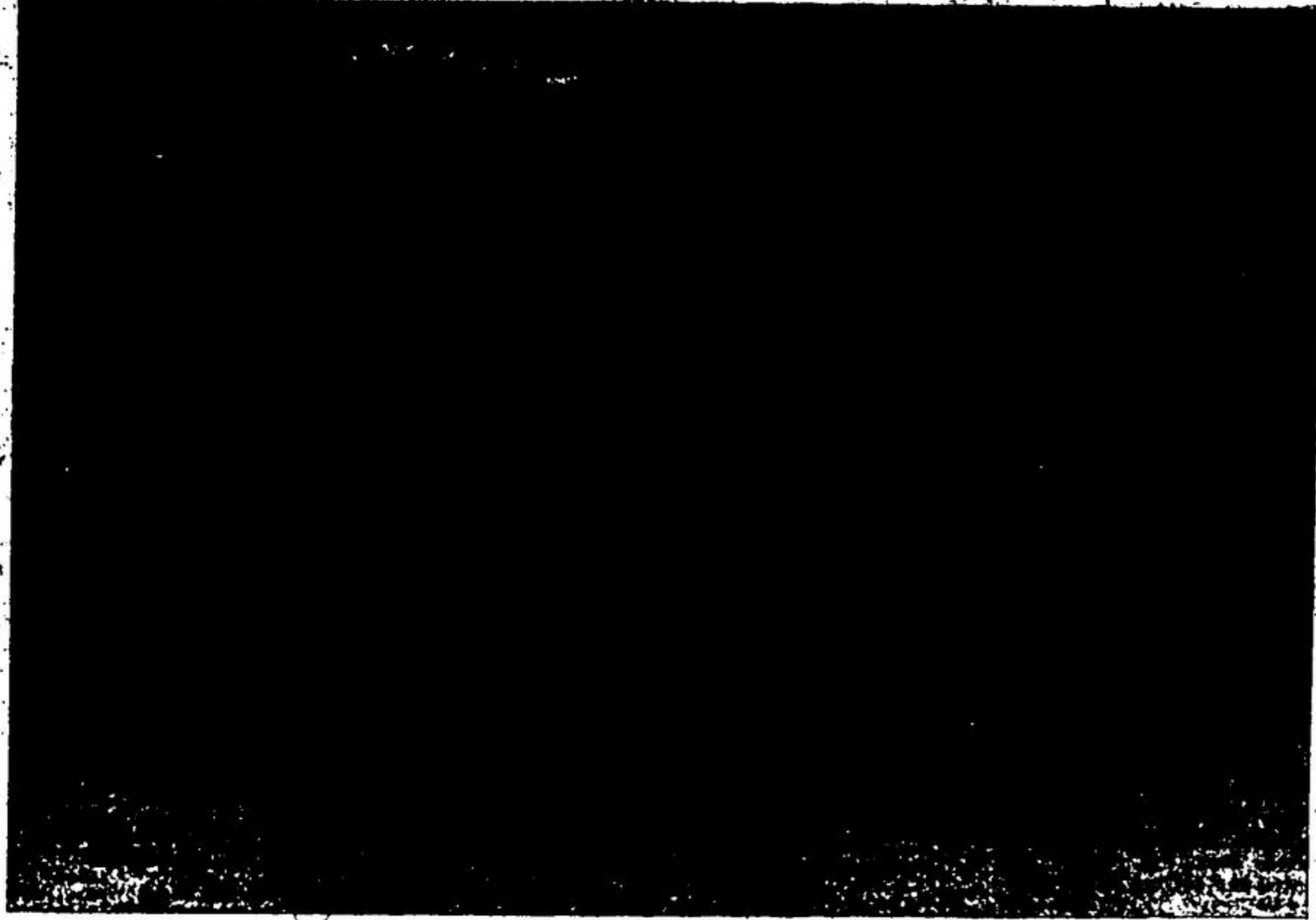
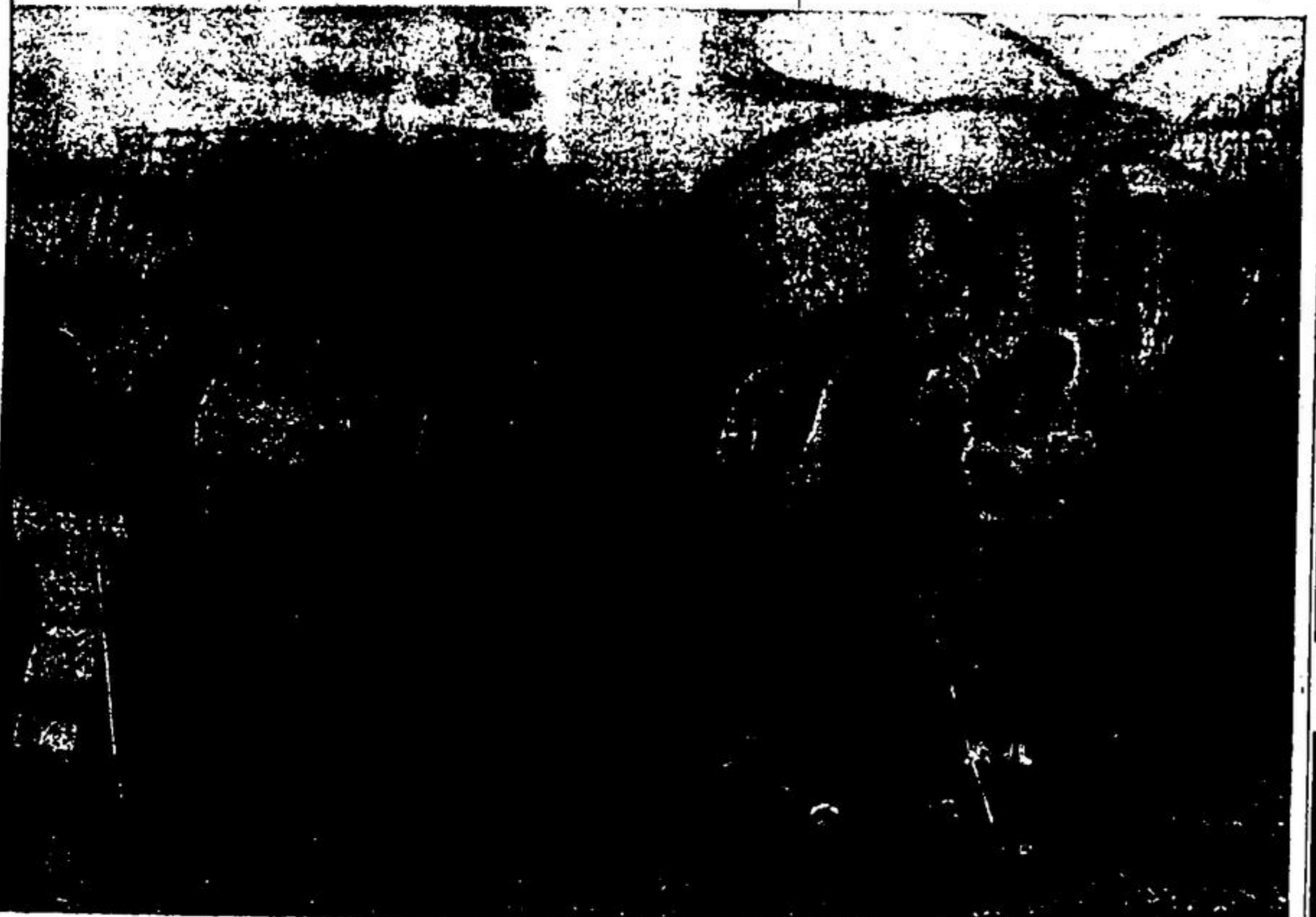


MIXED OPENING DAY

Beavers Bottle Toronto Irish in Exhibition Game

Georgetown Beavers didn't use their end of the playing field Sunday afternoon. Hosting Toronto Irish in Georgetown Park, Beavers contained Irish almost all afternoon and ran up an 11-0 score for their second consecutive exhibition game victory.

Tricks by Derek Ann and George Ferguson, and penalty kick by Les Judge and Judge's convert accounted for the Georgetown points.

Beavers' game was one of their strongest to date. The forwards played particularly well in the set and loose scrums, and they got more than their share of the lineouts. With a little more luck Beavers would have scored two and three more tries. The Irish never threatened to break the goose egg.

Bob Wrigglesworth, though he didn't score, made several long runs leaving many Toronto Irish in his wake. George Ferguson's try was the best of the afternoon. He skirted ar-

Local fans should be treated to some fine baseball this season as Georgetown has a full slate from Tykes to Intermediate. Home nights for teams are as follows: Monday: Pee Wees, Tuesday: Juniors; Wednesday: Intermediate; Thursday: Bantams; Saturday openings: Tykes and Sunday afternoons: Midgets. All evening games start at 6:30 p.m., with the Tykes starting time at 10 a.m. and Midgets starting time at 1 p.m.

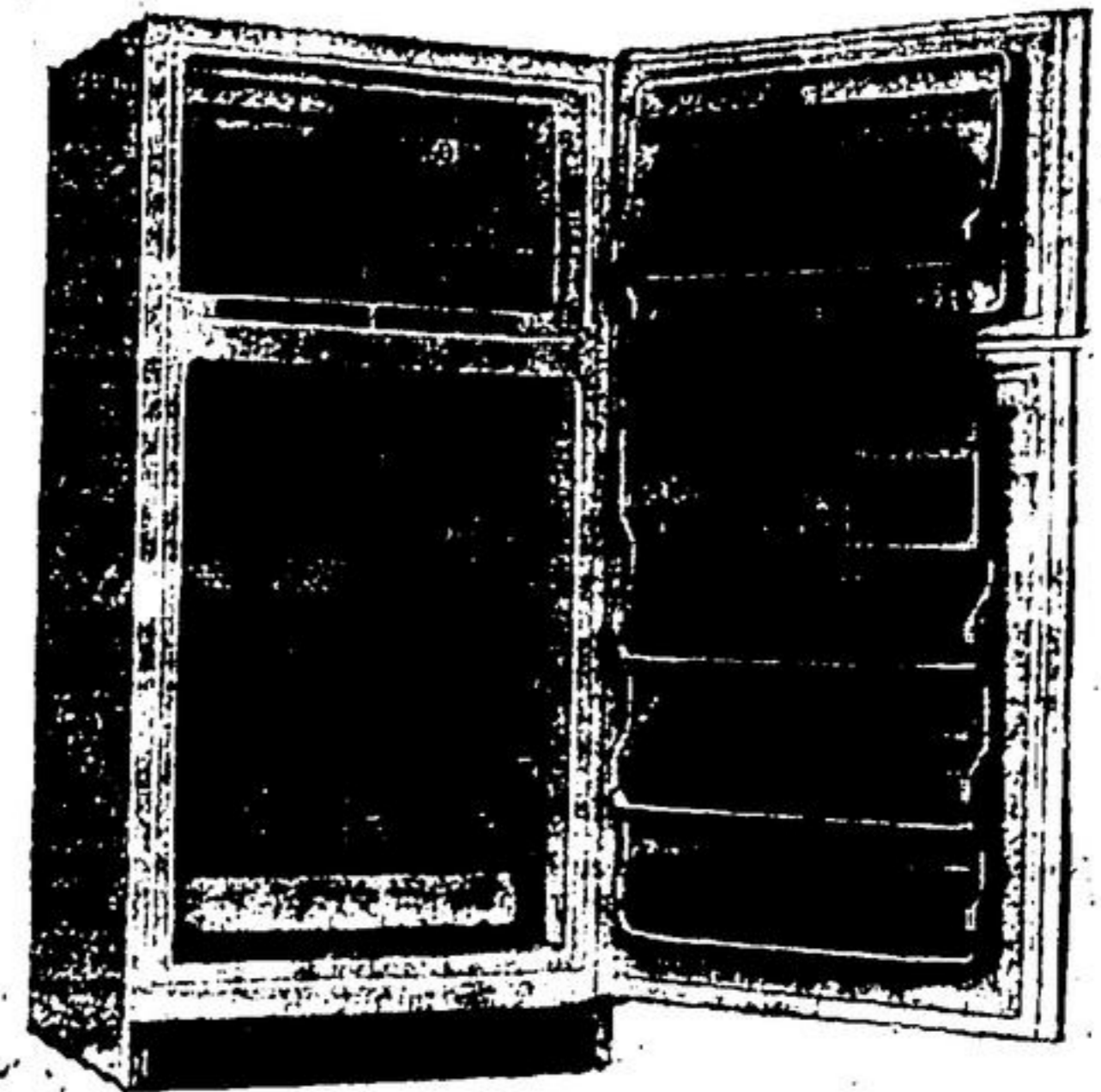
