Heart Attack at Work Fatal for Businessman

A Norval business man, Charles Stanley Fishburn, died suddenly while at work at his roofing business on a house at Inglewood on Friday, May 3rd, from a heart attack at the age of 51. He had no previous attacks so his sudden death was quite a shock.

Mr. Fishburn was born at Thornaby-on-Tees, Yorkshire, England. His parents Christopher Fishburn and Olive Gladders came to Hamilton when he was 4 years old. He was educated in Hamilton. While in his early teens he started the roofing business with his father which took him all over Ontario. He liked the Norval district, so purchased the property from the late Col. A. Noble and built a house and moved with his wife and family to Norval in 1948 but continued to operate his business from Hamilton.

His son Ronald joined the business in 1956 and it was then being operated by three generations. After Christopher Fishburn's death the business was conducted in the local area. His son Douglas joined in 1964. The scope of the business included residential roofing, industrial roof maintenance, sandblasting and truck refinishing.

Stanley C. Fishburn & Sons, had recently extended their operation into Brampton, operating Brampton Roofing Co., and into Orangeville, Ont., operating Orangeville Roofing Co.

Mr. Fishburn's main hobby was reading and he always kept up with world affairs by reading the daily papers. He had read the morning newspaper before going to work the day he died.

During his early years in Hamilton he attended St. Alban's Anglican Church and after moving to Norval his family joined the Norval United Church.

He is survived by his wife, Mona Harvey, and six children, Nancy, Mrs. Arthur Meadows of Caledonia, Ronald of Norval, Douglas of Georgetown, Sharon,

Mrs. Paul Atkinson of Brampton and Donna and David at home. Also four grandchildren Richard and Harold Meadows, Deanna and Beverly Fishburn.

He is also survived by his mother Mrs. Olive Fishburn of Hamilton and one sister, Rita, Mrs. David Proctor of Burlington, Ontario.

This funeral service was conducted by Rev. Walter Ridley of Norval United Church at the Harold C. McClure Funeral Home, Georgetown, on Monday afternoon, May 6th.
