The number of adults and children admitted was up by 35, and the number of births more than double those during the same period last year at Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital last month.

A statistical report on the hospital's operation in April just released, shows 175 adults and children admitted, and twenty nine births during the month. The rate of occupancy worked out to 101 per cent in medical and surgical, 47 per cent in the children's ward and 39 per cent in maternity.
