

Walkers Turn Over \$48,266 At Oxfam Collection Centre

When it's all in and counted, the amount raised by Halton Peel Oxfam walkers May 4 will be in the neighbourhood of \$60,000. That was the projection made by Oxfam committee treasurer George Wilson following collection day at St. Mary's auditorium, Brampton, Saturday.

On Saturday \$48,266 was turned over by walkers at the collection centre. Though this alone is almost \$10,000 more than last year's total it is estimated to be about 70 per cent of the final figure.

Last year's total earnings were \$39,800, and of this \$28,000 was taken in on the collection day. There were only 1,043 walkers last year compared to this year's 3,280.

"We're hoping for a total of \$80,000 based on a projection of the donations received, Saturday," Mr. Wilson said.

He had special commendation for Georgetown area walkers. "We received fantastic support from Georgetown this year both in walkers and sponsorship," he said.

The May 4 walk covered 30 miles from Brampton, through Hornby, Ashgrove, Stouartown, Georgetown, Norval, Huttonville and back to the starting point. About 1800, more than half the starters went the entire distance.

Oxfam is a world-wide organization helping to combat starvation, disease and illiteracy in more than 90 countries.
