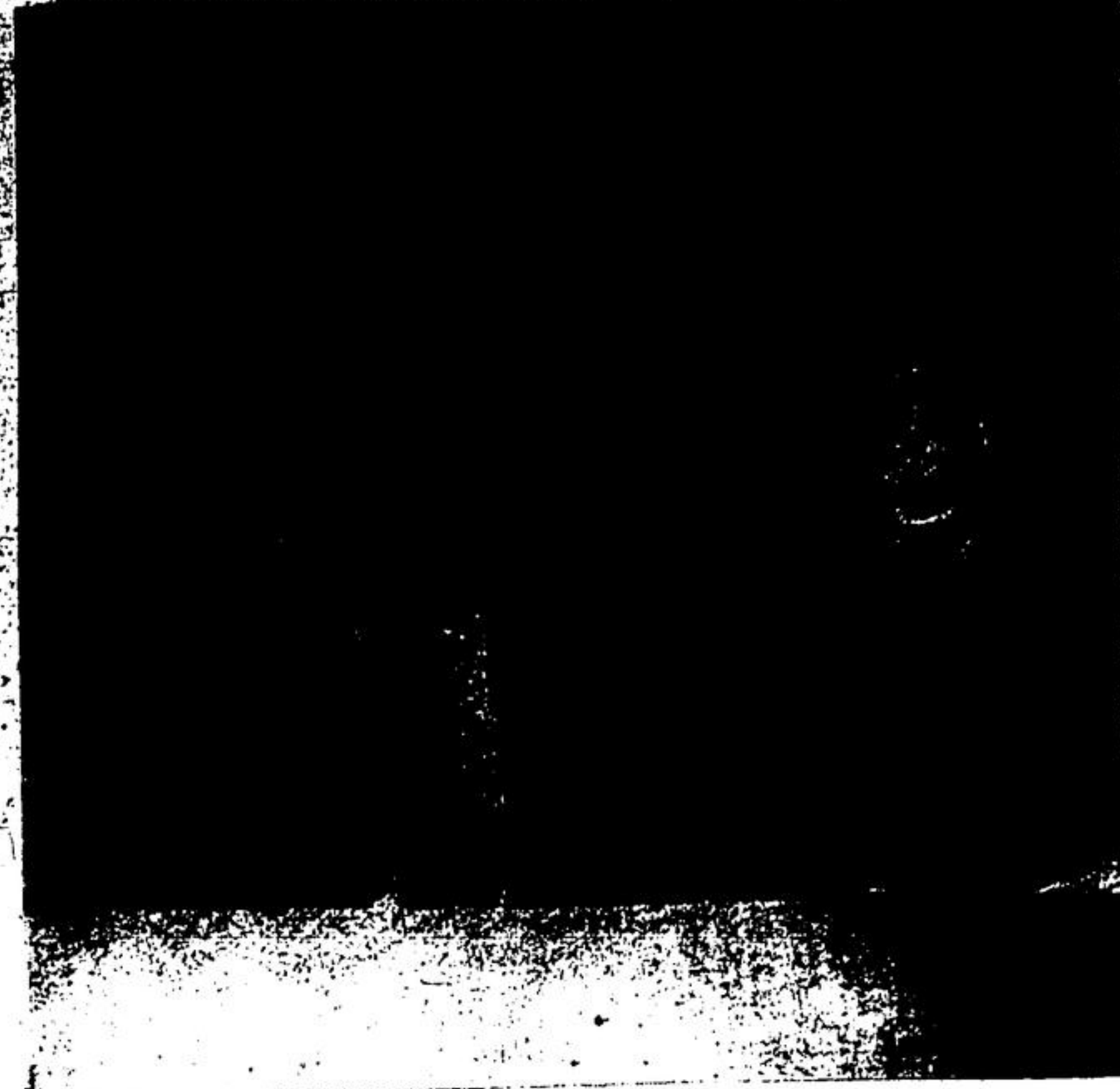


JOIN KERNIGHAN IN HALTON RIDING RACE

Moon Trips, But Can't Solve Medicare: Kernighan

Murray Kernighan, Halton New Democrat candidate, has called on scientists and engineers to turn their attentions more to human relations.

Speaking to a recent meeting of the NDP election committee in Milton, Mr. Kernighan pointed out that "sciences and scientists have produced great improvements in many areas. Means of transportation, medicine, the harnessing of natural resources, and many other areas have seen vast improvements in the past few decades. But there is a great need for the scientists and engineers to apply their skills toward making possible changes in our political and economic systems so these improvements can be made available to all.

"For example, it appears that a man will soon be sent to the moon. But society still does not have a method of sending a skilled surgeon to a sick man who lacks the money to pay for the surgeon's services."

Referring to some of the federal-provincial squabbles in recent years, Mr. Kernighan said "Men have succeeded in teaming up in industry to produce complicated machinery. But 11 premiers apparently are unable to team up and resolve such relatively simple matters as a just division of taxes, how to set up medicare or how to send a French-speaking representative to an international conference."

Mr. Kernighan's campaign has been under way since his nomination a week and a half ago. "We are not running any token campaign," he told the committee. "We are in this race to win."

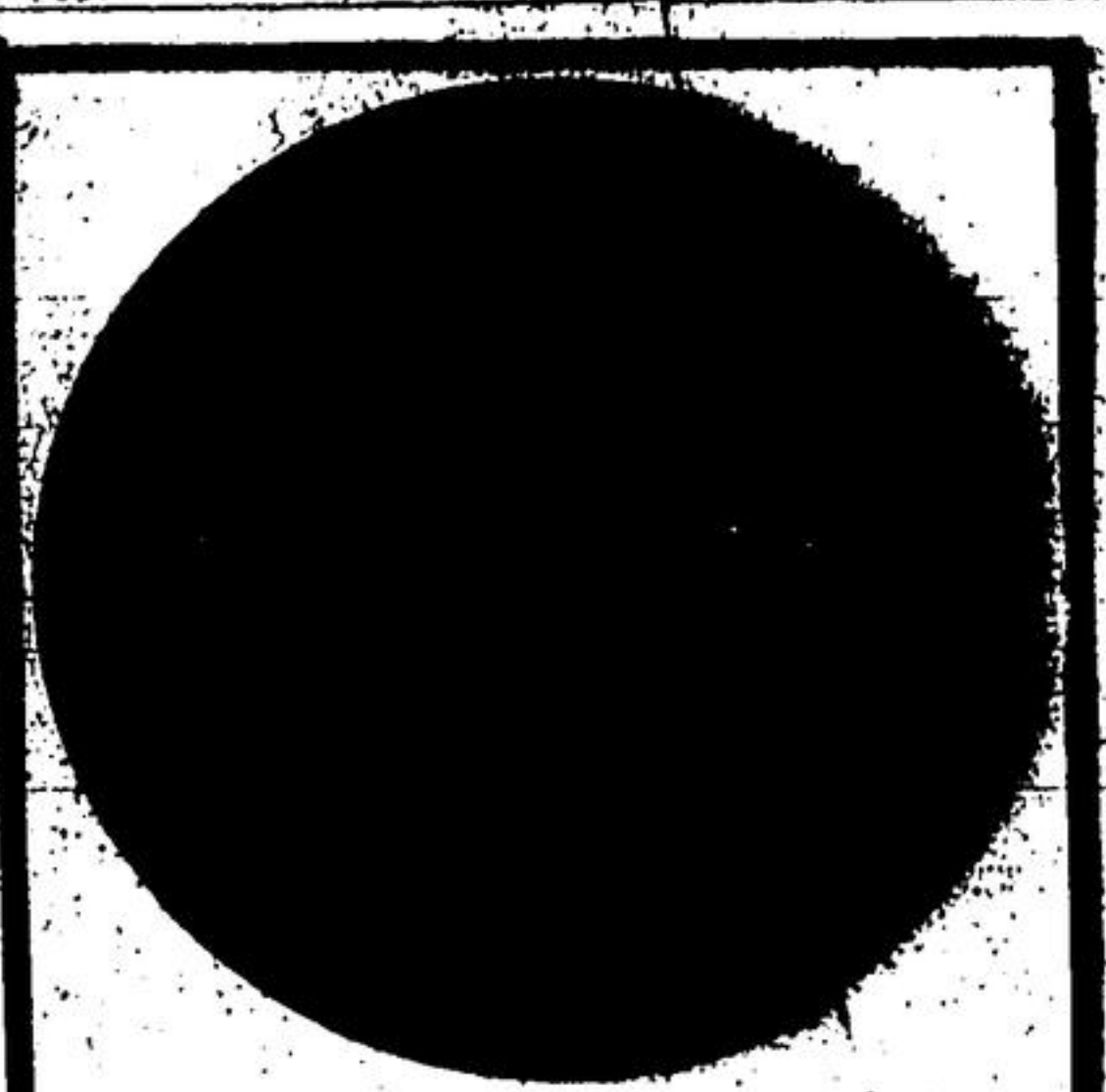
The chairman suggested the name, and the other members agreed it would be suitable — "male or female."
