Graham, Erin, Ontario was sold May 6 at the Hays Sales Arena, before an international group of buyers, 62 cattle going to the USA, Mexico, Brazil, Japan, South Africa and Italy. 125 head sold for \$133,925 to average \$1,071, highest at a dispersal sale this year.

With tongue in cheek, auctioneer Senator Harry Hays of Calgary sold the first, three animals of the sale as from Mrs. R. D. Graham. He picked a top family for this byplay as the oldest cow in the three generation group sold for \$10,000 her daughter for \$16,000 and the latter's ten month old daughter for \$2,100.
