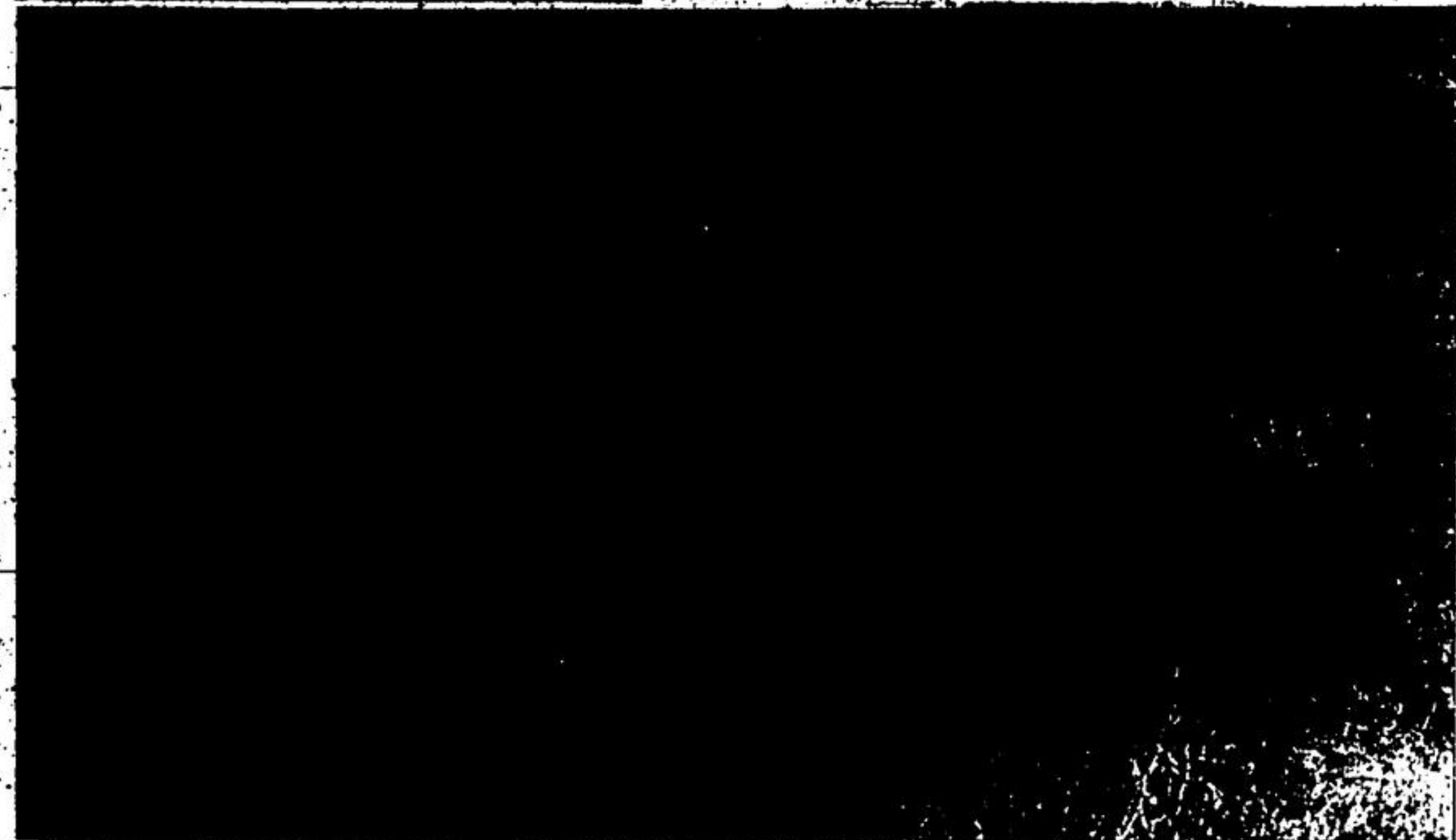


**PARK-KEEPERS BUFFALOED**

**Father was Prominent Saskatoon Businessman**

A pioneer businessman in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, John Morrison, 75, died in hospital here April 23. His daughter Mary is the wife of Rev. Robert Scrivens, minister at St. John's United Church here.  
Born near Seaford, Ontario, he went west in 1912 and became engaged in the automobile business. He served with the Royal Flying Corps in 1917-18.  
Returning to Saskatoon, he took over operation of the Automobile Clearing House in 1920. In 1922 he was joined by the late J.J. Olmstead and after Mr. Olmstead's death in 1952, he took over the presidency and operation of the entire business.  
In 1963, when he retired, he was honoured for his contribution to the retail trade and for outstanding leadership in business and community when he was presented with the Master Retailer award by the Saskatchewan Retail Merchants Association.

**Need No Private Property for Maple Improvements**

No private property will be acquired in the widening and paving of Maple Avenue, from Main Street out to the 7th line, said town engineer Gordon Fancy.  
Town-owned land in front of private property, will be used however, and from this town-owned land any trees deemed necessary to remove, will be cut down. "Not all trees will go from the town owned land," explained the engineer, "but certainly some will."  
Maple Avenue is not being redesigned as a four lane road. Primarily, it will be used for two lane traffic, with space for parking and turning. On the hill between Main and Edith Street, there will be an extra lane for slowmoving traffic.  
A sidewalk will be laid on the north side of Maple, with provision for a future sidewalk on the south side.  
Any agreements necessary between the town and property owners are simply to allow the town to enter upon private property, not to acquire. This may be necessary during the reconstruction. In all cases private property will be restored to its original condition.  
While the town wants to do the job this year, there is no guarantee this will happen, since both the Department of Highways and the County have yet to give their approval.

**Six Traffic Accidents In North Halton Area**

During the week of May 10-25, officers of North Halton Detachment, Ontario Provincial Police, investigated a total of 6 accidents. There were 7 property damage accidents and 1 personal injury accident which resulted in 2 persons being injured. Property damage totalled \$4,155. 2 charges were preferred as a result of these accidents. Inattentive driving, fail to yield right of way and driver lost control were the main causes of accidents.  
There were 3 break, enter and thefts investigated which included one in Esquesing Twp.; one at Ontario Rock drillers where 50 lbs. of dynamite were stolen; and one at a garage in Nassagaweya Twp. where 2 chain-saws valued at \$435 were stolen — the 2 saws have been recovered and 2 persons charged as a result. There was 1 minor theft and 2 other Criminal Code offences, under investigation; 1 theft from a service station resulted in 4 persons being arrested and charged; 2 Liquor investigations resulting in 2 persons being charged under the Liquor Control Act; 1 person charged with Assault and possession of offensive weapon; 1 premise found insecure at night; 1 missing person located for other police dept. and 1 stolen motorcycle recovered for other police dept.  
There were 80 charges preferred during this period. 85 warnings issued and 116 vehicles were safety checked.

**Nineteen Will Graduate At Maple Nursery School**

Nineteen tots will graduate from Maple Nursery School and on to higher education in Kindergarten this year. Mrs. William Scapion, president of the mothers auxiliary told The Herald this week.

**Cookie Sale is Success Sell 2604 Boxes**

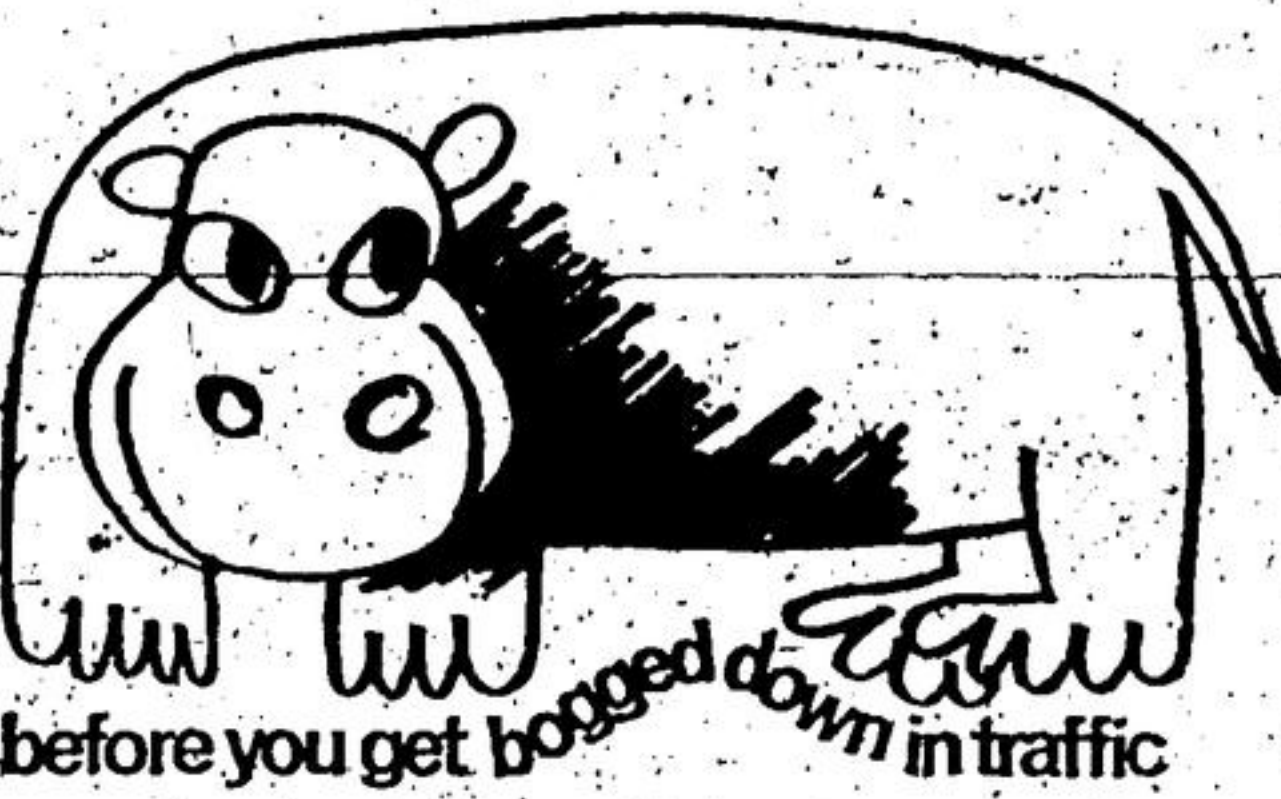
Girl Guides and Brownies in Georgetown and area sold 2,604 boxes of Girl Guid cookies during their recent cookie day it was announced this week by district officials.  
North Georgetown District and part of Credit Valley District sold 152 twelve-box cartons for a net profit of \$200 to be divided among the eight Georgetown packs and companies and those at Norval and Limehouse.  
In South Georgetown District where a shortage in cookies allowed them just 65 cartons, packs and companies kept whatever net profit they made for their own use.  
Fourth Guide company made \$17.80, 2nd \$13.20 and 3rd \$11.78. Fourth Brownie pack made \$14.82, 2nd \$13.20, 1st \$7.92, and 5th \$8.60.
