They were elected to office at the district annual held on May 22nd in St. George's Anglican Church, Georgetown.

Ten of the 411 clubs whose projects were 'Sleeping Farm-ers' and 'Featuring Fruit' were W.I. sponsored, and seven Halton institutes took part in the baking contest.

St. George's rector the Rev. Eric Mills, in welcoming delegates to Georgetown, spoke of his memories of English institutes, and their donations of fresh vegetables and clothing during the war, and their market stands filled with home-made preserves and jam.

The Daughters of the Church served dinner at noon. A musical program included accordion selections by Mrs. Herb Reid and a triple duet from Glen Williams school under the direction of Mrs. Gordon Kidney, who were winners at the music festival. The festival gets good support from institutes, according to a report submitted by Mrs. A. Benton, 1700 children from 14 schools competed this year.

Roll call of the 17 branches represented was pennies for friendship and hobby samples,

which included weaving, quilting, painting, rug making and petit point.

Mrs. Robert Kerr, past president of the Ontario Junior Farmers, explained their work.

A suggestion was made that plaques be placed on century homes. Members voted on a number of resolutions including enforcement of liquor laws, indicated fibre content on materials, sales tax rebates on children's clothing.

The institute will continue to provide a public speaking trophy and a scholarship fund for MacDonald Institute Guelph.

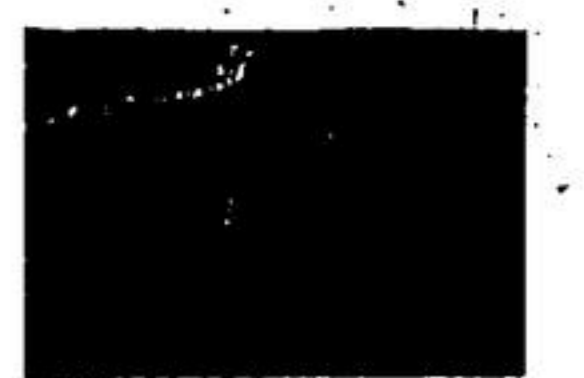

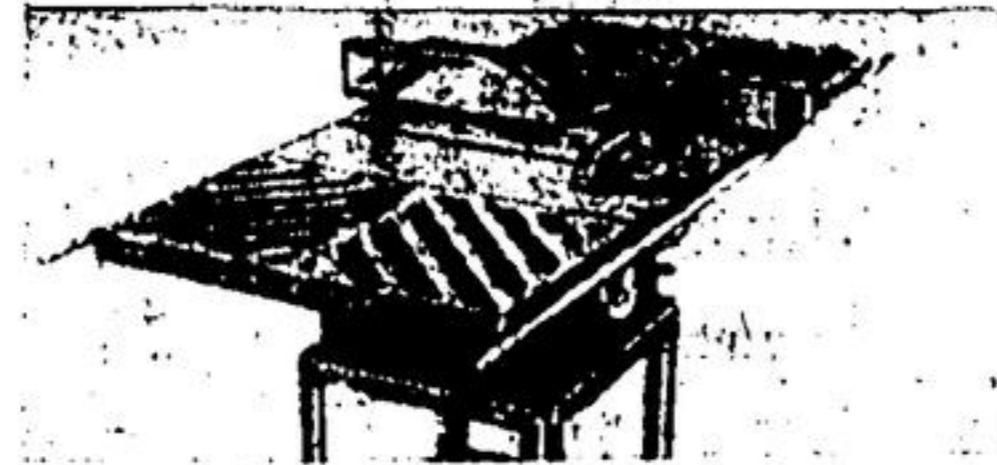

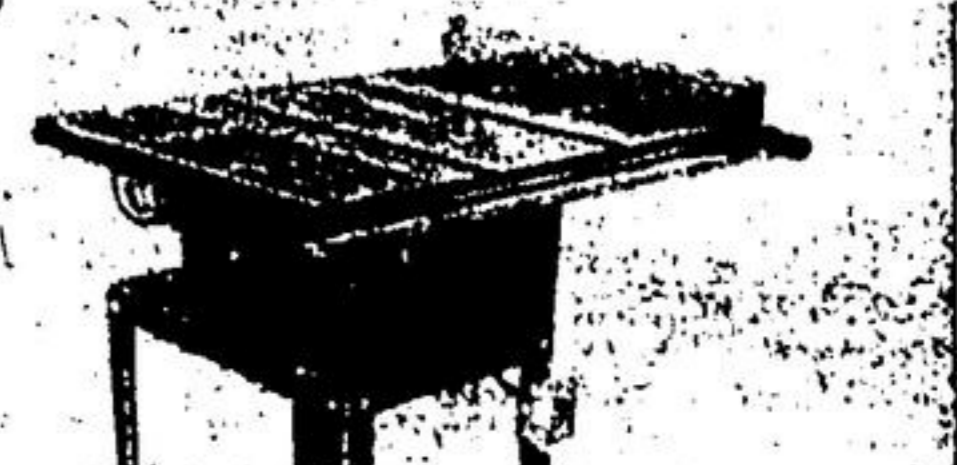
