NOTICE OF APPLICATION FOR ROAD CLOSING

IN THE COUNTY COURT OF THE COUNTY OF HALTON

IN THE MATTER OF THE Registry Act, RSO 1960, Chapter 348, Section 91.

ALL AND SINGULAR that certain parcel or tract of land and premises situate, lying and being in the Township of Essex in the County of Halton and Province of Ontario and being composed of part of Glen Street lying between Blocks 'E' and 'D' as shown on David Epcor's Survey of part of the Village of Glen Williams in part of the East Half of Lot 20 in Concession 9 in the said Township and filed as Registered Plan Number 10 in the Registry Office for the said County and which said part of Glen Street is more particularly described as follows.

Toyota Claims Two 'First's' in New Car

Toyota engineers claim two firsts with the new Toyota Crown Deluxe introduced at the Canadian National Sportsmen's Show this year.

1) The new car is the first popular priced sedan designed to meet the new US Federal Government Safety Standards, not adapted to comply with them.

2) The new Crown is quieter at 60 miles an hour in both the front and rear seats, a way of saying that it's probably the quietest sedan around.

The new Toyota Crown is being introduced in a higher price bracket than any previous Toyota sedan.

Equipment is a big part of the Toyota Crown story. Apart from having a collapsible steering column, impact absorbing steering wheel, fully padded dash and windshield pillars, break-away, day/night interior mirror and ash trays and a dual braking system, Toyota engineers have added their own safety wrinkles. These include an impact absorbing perimeter frame with front and rear torque boxes; front disc brakes with a power booster and a beam-type pressure control valve; an integral body structure with impact absorbing qualities; individual fuses for each headlight; tinted safety glass all round and individual grab handles for each passenger.
