Cumpsty Gets Post With Federal NDP

A Georgetown resident for the past twenty years, William (Bill) J. Cumpsty, 40 Main St. S. has been appointed Assistant Secretary to C. Scotton, Federal Secretary of the New Democratic Party.

In 1965 Mr. Cumpsty was an Ontario Provincial organizer and campaign manager in the Brackendale by-election. Then he became Ontario Regional Organizer for the Durham, Oshawa, Ontario South and Ontario Ridings. He held this position for 2 1/2 years.

In May of 1967 at the request of New Democratic Party leader T.C. Douglas he became the Finance Co-ordinator for the Federal Party — a post that involved fund raising trips across Canada.

In September 1967 he organized the Ontario Provincial campaign for the Oshawa riding that saw Cliff Plik defeat the incumbent conservative Albert Walker. Mr. Cumpsty has to his credit several successful election campaigns in Manitoba and British Columbia. He has never lost any election campaign he has managed.

Before entering politics he was a social worker for the Metropolitan Toronto, Department of Welfare and Housing.

Warn Motorists, Must Stop for School Bus

North Halton OPP detachment said in a news release to The Herald Tuesday complaints are still being received about motorists failing to stop for school buses.

As a reminder to all drivers, Section 94 (2) of the Highway Traffic Act states:

"Where a school bus is stopped on a highway or part of a highway on which the maximum speed is greater than 35 miles per hour for the purpose of receiving or discharging school children, the driver of a vehicle,

(a) when overtaking a school bus on which the words "do not pass when signals flashing" are marked and two red signal lights are illuminated by intermittent flashes; and (b) when meeting on such a highway, other than a highway with separate roadways, a school bus on the front of which two red signal lights are illuminated with intermittent flashes, shall stop the vehicle before reaching the bus and shall not proceed until the school bus resumes motion or the signal lights are no longer operating."
