Women's Institute Press Improved Medical Service

Delegates to the Halton Women's Institute annual in Georgetown voted unanimously in favour of a motion asking the Federated Women's Institutes of Ontario to do everything possible to improve doctors' services to residents in the county's rural areas. Before the vote, delegates heard of instances of doctors refusing to make home calls in rural areas "even in critical emergencies."

The following resolution will go to the Federated W.I. of Ontario: "Whereas difficulty has been experienced in critical emergencies requiring a doctor's service in rural areas; whereas doctors refuse to come to rural areas; and especially refuse to come at night, on holidays and weekends; therefore be it resolved that the Federated Women's Institutes of Ontario do everything possible individually and collectively to bring this matter to those in authority and ask them to use their influence to create a better situation."

Representing the Ballinfad branch of the Halton W.I. Mrs.

Jesse McEnery of Acton told the 100 women at the convention about such an instance.

Mrs. McEnery said she knows of one of the members whose husband was stricken with meningitis. The woman telephoned her doctor and wasn't allowed to talk to him because he was attending a maternity case.

The woman allegedly tried four other doctors each of whom for one reason or another said they couldn't come. She finally got a doctor from another town but not for four hours.

Mrs. McEnery said her area is "not too badly off" and expressed concern for outlying areas.

"We've always understood doctors had to swear an oath to serve their fellow man," Mrs. McEnery said.

She added that upon consulting "a local doctor" he told her there was "something wrong" because there is always supposed to be a doctor on call in the area.

The Halton W.I. convention, the 67th annual such event, was held in St. George's Anglican Church.

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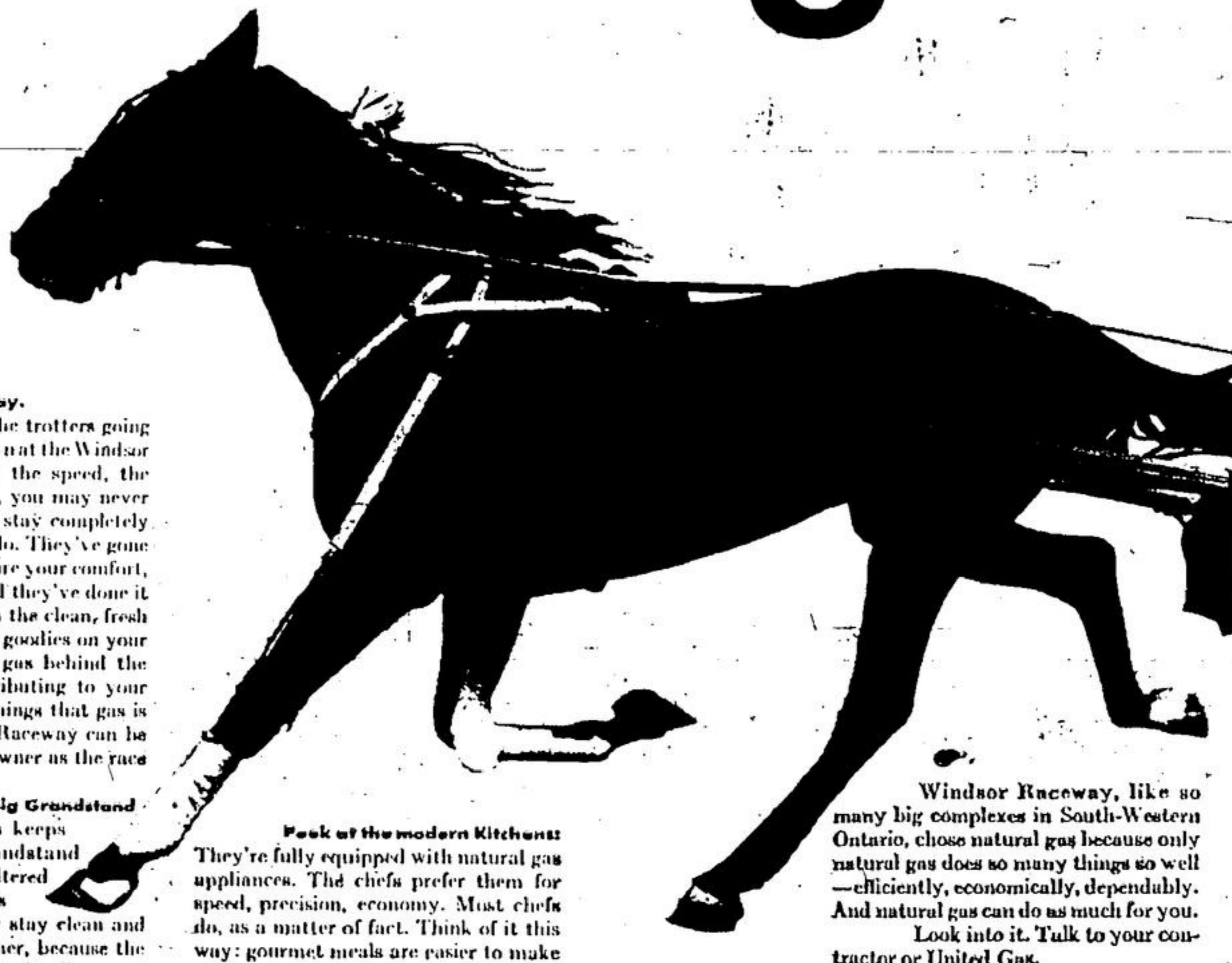
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
