Industry Zoning? Why Worry, Reeve's Opinion

"We haven't got any worries about industry," Esquimaux Township Reeve George Currie said at Monday's council meeting. "We don't have water or sewage so we don't attract them. And when we get any near town annexes it anyway."

He was replying to Malcolm Freeman of R.R. 1, Georgetown, who told council he is concerned about zoning and parking "where we're going to put industry when it comes in."

"I've been thinking about zoning for the past three years," Currie said. "I don't know what I'm referring to a breeder's magazine article written by an Esquimaux farmer which complains of the cutting up of 10 acre lots in the township."
