Annexation to Double Milton County Town

As of January 1, 1969, the town of Milton will double in size. The Ontario Municipal Board, Tuesday approved an annexation plan permitting Milton to annex 369 acres from Esqueping Township and an estimated 1,171 acres from rural Oakville.

The annexation increases Milton's overall area from 1,033 acres to about 2,500 acres.

Milton had sought to annex 2100 acres from Oakville but the final decision of the OMB cut this back.

In its report the OMB noted that Esqueping Township has no zoning controls.

In referring to the Esqueping Township report, the OMB stated that immediately south of Highway 401 and is obviously ripe for industrial development.

The applicant is in a position to supply municipal services and the Board has no hesitation in ordering its annexation.
