Points Need for More Room for Children's Aid

Halton Children's Aid Society staff should have more elbow room, a grand jury told Judge Alan B. Sprague in a written report to him this week.

The judge received the seven man jury in the courtroom at the county administration building here to accept its report on inspections of county municipal buildings this week.

The report indicated the grand jury was not pleased with the space situation at the CAS Milton headquarters on Hugh Street and recommended that 'the entire staff could be moved into the Health Unit, as there seems to be plenty of space available' there.

The jury criticized the cramped office quarters, pointing out the CAS staff are housed in an old building.

The county health unit is just around the corner on adjacent King Street, behind the county jail, and Milton magistrate's courthouse.

Judge Sprague told the jury its report and recommendations would be brought to the attention of the proper authorities, although it should not expect its recommendations to be acted upon immediately.

The grand jury considered facilities and conditions at Halton County Manor — the home for the aged — 'excellent.'
