

"Up" Week for Giants In Win Column Twice

Georgetown Giants treated more like midgets in the early going in the Halton Intermediate Baseball League have considerably improved their stature during the past week.

They gave Lesaide Maple Leafs their biggest score before finally bowing 4-3 to the Metro club last Wednesday; burst into the win column with a 4-2 victory over Preston Pirates Thursday, and on Sunday tripped up Oakville Oaks 7-8 right in acorn country.

They started the eighth but it was called before Georgetown finished their half because of darkness.

Schiller finished up one and a third innings. He struck out one and didn't walk a batter.

McGill was the winner. He went five innings and was lifted for a pinch hitter in the sixth. McGill gave up four runs on four hits. He fanned two and walked just one.

Jim James rapped three singles and Davison slammed a homer and a single to lead the Giants' hitting.
