Mr. Hunter, who lived at 151 Main Street North, was a native of Norval, son of John and Margaret Kerr Hunter. He attended school there, farmed in Esquewaug until moving to Georgetown in 1936. He worked with the highways department for five years before joining the Domtar firm.

Mr. Hunter was a veteran of World War I and a member of Branch 120, Canadian Legion. With Mrs. Hunter who was the former Margaret Marchment, he celebrated their golden wedding anniversary on December 31st last year.

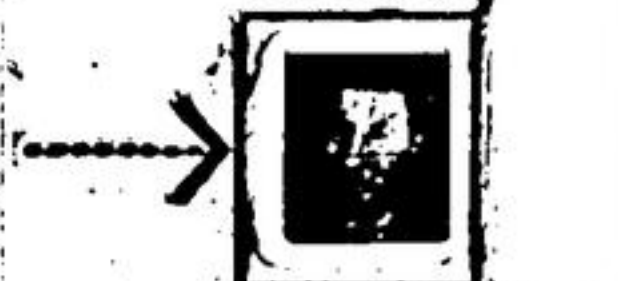
over three hundred members could be so impartial when many thousands of dollars are involved.

JIM SNOW REPORTS



THIS WEEK, the Honourable Charles S. McNaughton, Provincial Treasurer, introduced legislation establishing the Department of Revenue for the Province of Ontario. This legislation has the effect of splitting the responsibilities of the Treasury Department into two departments — one being the new Department of Revenue and the second being the Department of Treasury and Economics.

OTHER IMPORTANT legislation introduced this week includes an Act to amend the Consumers' Protection Act, which was passed a little more than a year ago and will provide considerable additional protection to the consumer.

THIS WEEK the Honourable John P. Roberts, announced the appointment of a Select Committee to consider and study all briefs and submissions pertaining to the recommendations of the Smith Committee Report on taxation. I was most honoured to be one of the thirteen members selected for this committee which will be under the Chairmanship of Mr. John White, Member for London South. It is our duty as the Select Committee to consider the 207 briefs and submissions and to hear some further submissions on the recommendations of the report.

OUR SESSIONS started this last Tuesday morning and will continue during the mornings until the session recess and after that time you can still find them on the committee during the summer so that the deadline date for the submis-

tion of our report can be met on September 17th in order that the government can prepare legislation based on recommendations of the committee, ready for the Fall session of Parliament.
THIS WEEK we completed the consideration of the estimates for the Department of Revenue and also those of the Department of Transport. Presently the Department having the largest budget, that of the Department of Education is now under consideration by the Legislature.
I WAS VERY pleased last Friday afternoon to have as visitors to the Ontario Legislature sixty-two students from E.J. James Public School in Oakville who sat in on the sessions of the Legislature for a short time and also toured the government buildings.
