DEFENDS FARMERS, SAYS CARE USED ON HIGHWAYS

An anonymous letter criticizing Halton farmers for driving farm machinery on the roads, and published by two Halton newspapers has brought swift reaction from Halton's agricultural representative Henry Stanley.

"Certainly farm vehicles are a hazard on highways" he said. "One of the principle reasons is the fact that urban people do not realize how slow a farm tractor moves."

"As a result they are upon the farm machinery before they decide to slow down."

Mr. Stanley says last year in Ontario there were 286 accidents involving farm machinery and highway vehicles. As a result 11 farm machinery operators died.

"As a result of collisions the chance of survival is 17 to one in favour of the motorist," Mr. Stanley added.

"Thus, farmers have been using the unpaved portion of the highway whenever possible, and are pulling off and allowing other vehicles to pass if they find they are holding up traffic."

He said the anonymous letter writer who signed himself, "Concerned" felt that farmers should not be on the roads with their machinery.

"This is an absolute necessity in Halton — a county which is being over-run with rural non-farm houses and ten-acre lots," Mr. Stanley said.

He said over 40,000 acres of farm land in Halton was rented and said if it were not so the county would be "an unsightly mass of weeds."

Mr. Stanley asked: "How else can a farmer move between farms without using the roads?"

"The farmer pays taxes on the roads, not only on his house as does the urban dweller, but on his barn, implement shed, and all the land he owns."
