

WISHING TO ATTEND SUMMER SCHOOL MUST PICK UP AN APPLICATION SUMMER SCHOOL-FROM THE GUIDANCE DEPARTMENT AT GEORGETOWN DISTRICT HIGH SCHOOL

Grades 9 to 12:

Central Peel District High School Board is continuing summer school - this year at the Centennial Secondary School in Brampton. The purpose of this sure a chool is to offer additional assistance to students who wish to improve the convey. There are three areas in which they are offering courses.

A. An enrichment course. The purpose of this course is for students who have done well in school but are not able to take the courses offered in their own program. This is an excellent opportunity for students in these fields.

B. Improvement courses are being offered to students who have been promoted but are low in one or two subjects. The students will find difficulty in toking these subjects next year, and are strongly advised to take these at summer school. This would give a firm background to start fresh in September, and the marks earned will be used to revise the student's promotion marks.

C. Make-up courses are offered for those students who are below promotion standard in one or more subjects. This is an opportunity to save a full year in the studen'ts educational life. Marks from these courses will be counted towards raising the student's promotion standard.

The Central Peel District High School Board has set this school up for the sole purpose of helping the students. As a result, they have only hired aboveraverage teachers, and in most cases, department, heads, to teach, in this program.

I am very pleased to say that Central Peel District High School Board has again invited Georgetown District High School to participate in this program and we have gladly accepted. The summer school will be from July 2 to August 9 inclusive. Examinations will be held at the end. The marks will be returned to this high school and we will inform the students of the results.

Our students attending the summer school must take two, and only two, subjects, and the fee for this course will be \$35, payable to the Central Peel District High School Board on the day of registration at Central Peel Dis-Wrict High School. Registration will take place at Central Peel District High School, Kennedy Road and Highway No. 7, Brampton, on June 26, 27 and 28. The student MUST have a letter from the Principal.

Students recommended to take Improvement or Make-up courses will be notified by mail. Students wishing Enrichment courses, or feel that they should take Improvement or Make-up courses, but not notified before receiving their report card, should contact the Guidance Department.

The Georgetown District High School Board is offering free transportation to help the students. There will be a bus leaving the high school at 9 o'clock on June 27 to take students to Central Peel for registration, and will return as soon as the students are registered. Anyone wishing to register after that will have to find his own transportation to Central Peel.

The regular classes will be from 9 a.m. to 12:20 p.m. each-day. .Each class will be of 90 minutes duration, and will consist of 45 minutes of instruction, followed by 45 minutes of supervised study. The bus will leave every morning from the Georgetown District High School at 8.30, and will leave Central Peel District tright 1 and at 12.30 each day, and return the students to the high school.

I am confident that the parents and students will recognize the value of this summer school and will cooperate in taking the maximum advantage of this offer.

The following courses will be offered to students who have been promoted, but who had low marks in one or two subjects. The summer course provides an opportunity for these students to improve their background and to gain confidence in the subjects. Examinations will be held at the end of the summer school.

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III. Section C - Make-up: Two subjects required per student, 4 and 5

The following courses are offered to students who have failed in not more than three subjects of the year's work and whose mark in each of the subjects failed is 40 or more, and whose average on all subjects is not less than 50%.

 Grade 9 -- English, History, Geography, Mathematics, Science, French, Typing 1.

Grade 10 - English, History, Geography, Mathematics, Science, French, Latin, Bookkeeping 1, Shorthand 1.

Grade 11 - English, History, Geography, Mathematics, Physics, Latin, French.

Grade 12-English, History, Economics, Mathematics, Chemistry, French, Latin, Geography.

Grade 13:

Courses in Grade 13 subjects will be offered by Mississauga, Burlington, and Hamilton Boards. All three boards have agreed to accept our Grade 13 students. There will be NO transportation provided for these courses.

A Grade 13 student may only attend summer school if the subjects he is taking were taken this year but failed, and if the subjects will qualify him for a Secondary School Honour Graduation Diploma (7 credits.)

All students must arrange for summer school at the Gui lance Department at Georgetown District High School before going to summer school.
