Says Cemetery Board Bans Flowers on Graves

Branding it a "shocking situation", Kinsmen Bill Sunnucks, told council Monday of the removal and destruction of all the flowers and wreaths from the grave of the late Kinsmen Glen Wright, by the Cemetery Board.

Mr. Sunnucks said he had been called by the distraught family, many of whom were present at the meeting, telling him that they had been told by the Cemetery Board that no flowers and wreaths can be on the graves before there is a monument. "This could take a couple of months," said the Kins president.

He claimed the Board is now dictating the size and type of monument. He contended further, that the Board had refused to allow more flowers to be put on the grave, and had in fact turned them away. "It seems the flowers get in the way of grass cutting," commented Mr. Sunnucks.

"I never heard of such a thing," exploded Reeve William Hunter, "lots of people have flowers on graves before there's a monument."

"I demand an explanation," Cr. Robert Francis challenged. "we can't put up with this."
