# ELECTION FIGHT HEATS UP

Holy Cross auditorium may well have been a sports arena for three hours Tuesday night. Progressive Conservative Peter McWilliams, in boxer fashion, hammered blows to the head and mid-section of the federal government. New Democrat Murray Kernighan, the wrestler, squeezed the Liberals in a bear hug of reforms, and Liberal Rud Whiting, like a fence-guarded and parried thrusts from two sides while scoring some touches of his own.

The crowd of 350, almost all of them already committed to their particular candidate, reacted in true sports fan fashion. They shouted, booed, cheered, stomped their feet and applauded and proclaimed their favorite players on placards and banners.

Whatever else the Georgetown Jayvees' Meet the Candidates Night was, it wasn't dull.

Former Crown Attorney McWilliams, first to speak, ripped into the Liberal party for claiming to be the party for a united Canada.

"This is the party that has given everything to Quebec, and widened the French-English split during the last five years," he charged. "This is the Pearson party that poured so much money into Montreal, which Ontario and the rest of the provinces are now paying for."

Shifting his attack to Prime

Minister Trudeau he said, "And this is the man who is supposed to be the Liberals' saviour — where was he during the war?"

Anticipating Whiting's remarks he said, "The Liberal candidate will say two things tonight. He'll say he stands for a united Canada and for Trudeau."

"Trudeau is enflaming Quebec, while Bob Stanfield is approaching the unity question with much more common sense and calmness."

He pounded at Liberal inexperience. "Trudeau, an unproved leader, is running without eight of his last cabinet, and 26 members of the last government, while PC's have fielded a team of experienced men with positive policies."

Swinging at inflation he said, "People are coming home with more money today, but prices are increasing so rapidly it does not go any farther. Inflation here is increasing faster than in many countries including the US and Germany, even though the States have to finance a war."

In a final volley he said, "Trudeau is asking Canada to go on a blind date with him. Stanfield is the proven man with the proven team, and won't have to do a solo act."

NDP Murray Kernighan, a Milton businessman, scoffed at the Liberals' unity issue. "That was the issue in the last federal election and in a book of my father's from 1919 I read that

it was supposedly the issue then. In those days it was called wrapping yourself in the flag."

"If the Liberals have some method of preventing disunity why have they let it get this way?" he asked.

He stressed the NDP leader Tommy Douglas has more experience than the other two leaders put together, and then focused on his party's plan for a guaranteed annual income.

"Some people have a guaranteed annual income, but there are many who do not," he said, citing physically handicapped, retarded, older residents, and adding to the list convicts just released from prison.

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## Anonymous Call Threatened Cadi

A Georgetown magistrate, John Ord, has been threatened by an anonymous telephone caller in connection with a case before him in Brampton court.

The caller said Monday night that Magistrate Ord would "get it" if a man due to come before him Tuesday was jailed.

"Monday my son received a call from some person and was told that if anything happened to the man, I would rue it. Then after I had gone to bed Monday night I received a second call and was told if the man was sent to prison I would get it."

"I know it is the popular thing these days to threaten persons of prominence, but I didn't think that they had come down to judges yet," Mr. Ord added.

He said he was not holding the man on trial responsible for the calls, and is not worried about the implication of violence. "But what does worry me is that some person is trying to influence the course of justice."

## Stranded on Tracks Train Wrecks Car

A late model car was totally wrecked when hit by a CN freight train near Georgetown station Tuesday morning. The driver of the car, Ralph Eugene Parker of Brampton had left his vehicle stranded on the rail to look for help when the accident happened.

Police said the westbound train, three diesel and 51 cars, carried the Parker car 240 yds. along the tracks before coming to a stop.

Parker had driven onto the tracks accidentally and was unable to drive off.

The CN engine was operated by L.G. Lindsay of Burlington. Georgetown constable J. Poole placed damage to the car at \$1,500.

## Glen School Girl Is Victim of Near-Drowning

A seven year old Glen Williams girl is "in good shape" after being snatched from drowning in Kelso Conservation Area swimming pool Monday.

A Milton hospital spokesman said Lynn Hooker was held there for only a few hours for observation before her release, following the mishap.

Lynn passed out in the deep end of the pool where the water temperature was only 57 degrees. None of her 65 school chums who were playing in the pool at the time, noticed her go under.

When Lynn sank, three lifeguards plunged into the water and one, Sharon Proctor of Burlington, dragged the unconscious girl to safety.

Milton lifeguard Jim Mercer immediately applied artificial respiration and Lynn came around shortly before being taken to hospital.

Lynn was with a party of her school mates from Glen Williams public school who visited the Kelso area Monday afternoon.

## Separation By-Law Amendment Includes a 'Five Year' Clause

Effective Monday night with the passing of the by-law, no land can be sold in the township of Esquevas until it has been owned five years by the same owner.

This amendment to the separation by-law is an attempt to halt speculation in land. This is the major change in the separation by-law.

In consolidating all the separation by-laws and amendments the by-law listed the various other restrictions on separations. They read as follows:

- 1) No separation of less than 20,000 sq. ft. or with lesser frontage than 125 ft. on an established road, shall be allowed except in a registered plan of subdivision.
- 2) \$300 per separation will be paid to the township.
- 3) No person or corporation shall be granted a separation until such time as they have been registered as owner of subject property for a period of five years.
- 4) No person or corporation shall be granted more than one separation per calendar year from each 100 acre lot, and no more than a total of four separations from a 100 acre lot, except in a registered plan of subdivision.
- 5) There will be no more than three separations from a 75 acre lot, at a rate of one per year.
- 6) There will be no more than one separation per year from a parcel of 25 to 50 acres, to a total of two.
- 7) In the case of parcels of less than 25 acres, the person applying for separation must have been the registered owner for at least five years prior to the application (the same as everyone else), but must wait a further five years for the second application, except in a plan of subdivision.

## Terms New Water Well Promises High Capacity

Zumber four well, the new water source that will end Georgetown's current shortage is no ordinary waterhole.

John Nunan of Hydrology Consultants, Cooksville, Thursday called it one of the "highest capacity wells in Ontario" after testing its output at 1,000 gallons per minute, about one and

half million gallons per day.

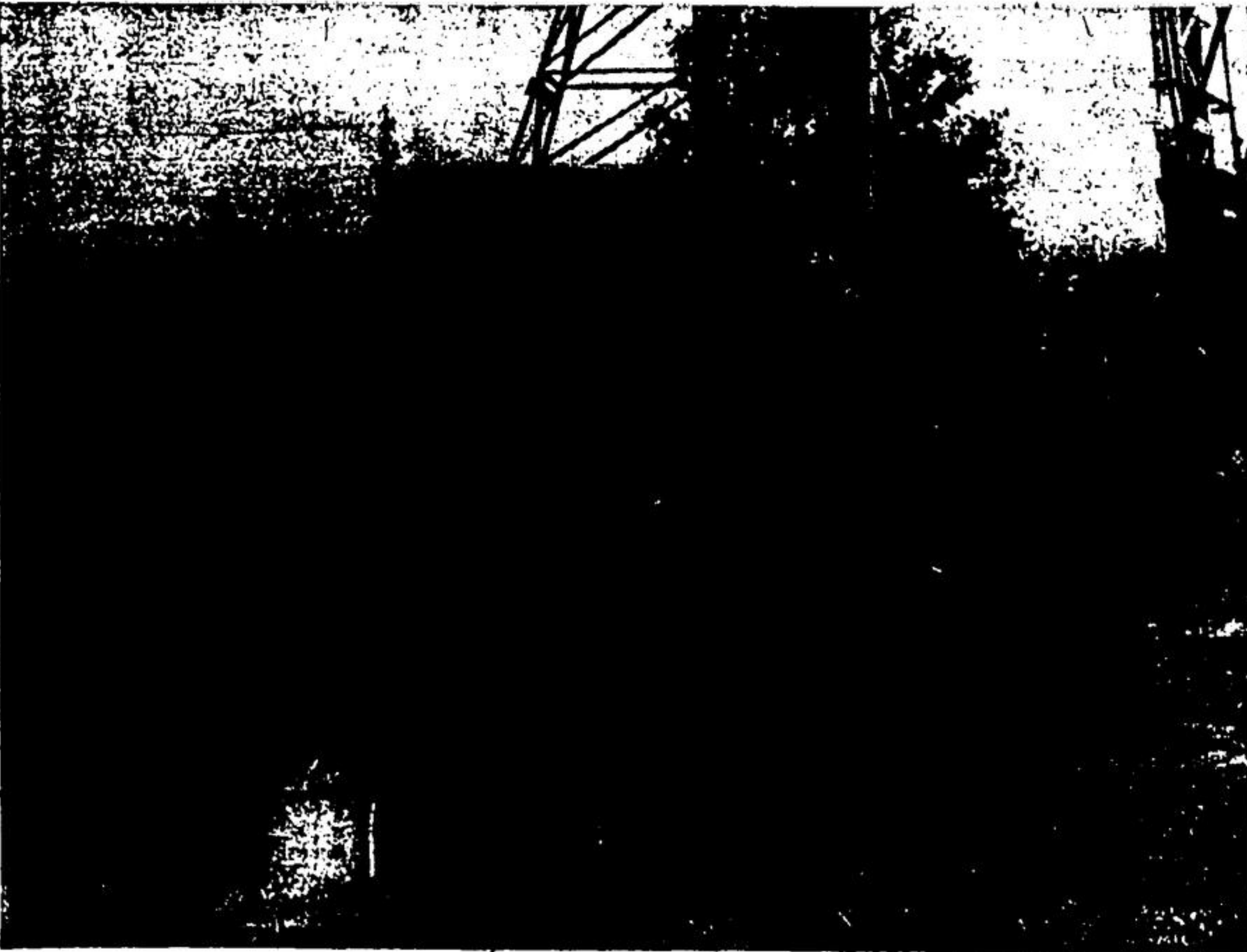
"When the new well goes into service it should increase the total water supply system in Georgetown by over fifty per cent," he said. "This is one of the best wells I've seen. Its capacity is almost equal to the other three wells combined."

The three existing wells have a total yield of 1.8 million gallons per day.

Number four well, struck 95 feet down was brought in on the fourth test drilling in the Cedarvale area. It is located on the eastern edge of Centennial park.

Designed and engineered by Hydrology Consultants Limited, it was constructed by Rutledge Water Wells Limited of Nobleton.

Work on constructing a pump house, installing a pump and laying a connecting link to the water system will take three weeks to a month.

## Feared Drowning, Police Combed River at Norval

Police and Norval village residents probed the Credit river near the Riviera for several hours Friday night searching for a drowning victim that apparently never was.

"It started at about 6:30" a woman helping the searchers explained. "Some children came running from the river yelling a boy in a plaid shirt had fallen into the river and was floating away." She said she went running to the river with the children and another woman went to get some help.

Several hours later the searchers who had waded down the river about a half mile poking into the deep spots gave up because of darkness.

Georgetown police and OPP, both of whom were involved in the search said yesterday that as yet no person has been reported missing in the area.

"One woman who heard the story from the same children said, 'The day before, they told my girl there were monsters up on the Anglican church. I guess they had been telling stories like this to just about every kid around here.'"

A spokesman for North Halton OPP which sent several officers to the scene, had a slightly different explanation. "We're not sure what the kids saw if they saw anything at all. Perhaps some boy did fall in and scrambled out further down the river; or it might have been an older child kidding that he was drowning while swimming. I just hope in the event of a real accident Norval residents will act as quickly as they did Friday."

## Planning Complete No. 7 Reconstruction

Highway 7 between Georgetown and Acton will undergo major changes in a five year reconstruction program outlined recently by the Department of Highways to officials from the county.

The highway will be completely reconstructed with major changes being new sweeping curves cutting off the present sharp corners on the 7th Line of Esquevas near Georgetown's western limit, and at Silvercreek.

A new intersection at the Lanehouse road junction will include acceleration lanes.
