### Mrs. W. H. Long Widow Of Restaurant Man

A Georgetown resident for 55 years, Mrs. William H. Long, 77, died on June 6 at the Brampton Nursing Home, Brampton.

Mrs. Long and her husband, who died in 1944 operated a restaurant and were Gray Coach agents for many years in what is now Stan's Restaurant.

Born in Gall, she was the former Ethel Mary Wallace, daughter of James S. Wallace, and Jane Weir and attended public school and business college there. She married Mr. Long at Glen Morris in 1914. She was at one time an employee of the Dayfoot Shoe Company.

Mrs. Long was a charter member of Verdun Rebekah Lodge, and belonged to the United Church Women of St. John's Church.

She leaves a daughter Margaret, Mrs. Joe McClintock, a granddaughter, Mary, Mrs. Jim Hurst, and great-granddaughter Leah Hurst. She was predeceased by two brothers and a sister.
