A provincial grant of \$15,500 for capital improvements in the Kelso conservation area has been approved. The 350-acre area is the site of an 85-acre water storage and flood control reservoir in Nasagaweya township.

Eighteen mothers-in-waiting, one of the largest classes ever enrolled here have been attending pre-natal classes under the instruction of Mrs. Cathy Mugford, of the Health Unit in Knox Hall since May 2. The current program finishes June 27th.

The Glegg Eden Ski area inside Kelso proved very successful this past winter. During the first few weeks the area was open this December, the gate receipts were as large as for all the previous seasons.

Hornby Robbery Investigated by OPP

During the week of June 2 to 8, inclusive, officers of North Halton Detachment Ontario Provincial Police conducted an armed robbery investigation which occurred at Crawford's General Store, Hornby, on Wednesday June 6, resulting in a male person being arrested by Woodstock OPP after a series of auto thefts between Milton and Woodstock. This person has been charged with armed robbery and auto theft by the investigating officer, Prov. Const. W. H. Jorlan of North Halton detachment. Other charges are pending by Guelph and Kitchener OPP detachments as well.

There were 8 liquor investigations resulting in 8 persons being charged under the Liquor Control Act. 3 thefts reported are being investigated. There were 3 other Criminal Code offences and 1 person charged with impaired driving, as well as 1 premise found insecure at night.

Alberta Man Spent Boyhood in Erin

A man who spent his boyhood years in Erin, and who has several relatives in this district, James Earl Ellenton, 78 died at Nanton, Alberta last month.

Born at Violet Hill, Ontario, he was the son of William and Mina Gibson Ellenton. When his mother died in 1895, he went to live with paternal grandparents in Erin where he attended public school.

He went west as a young man, first living in Banff, Alberta and later moving to Nanton in 1915. He served overseas in World War I with a Calgary regiment, the 31st Battalion in France, Germany and Belgium.

After the war he went to work for the CPR as a logger, and in 1925 returned to Nanton and farmed for seven years. He was a trucker until 1941, worked in a Calgary munitions plant until 1945 and from then until he retired was a carpenter and gardener.

He had been a member of Nanton United Church for the past 43 years, was a member of Nanton Legion and the A.O.T.S. Men's Club at the church. As a young man he loved sports and was outstanding in foot racing when he was in the army.

He leaves his wife Sadie, whom he married in 1929 two sons, Earl Kaye Ellenton of Olds, Alberta and Gary Lee Ellenton of Calgary; and eight grandchildren.

He was predeceased by a brother George Clarence of Toronto in 1945 and a sister, Violet Ellenton Barnes in 1929.

Funeral service took place in Nanton United Church with burial in Nanton Cemetery.

SUMMER SCHOOL - 1968

ANY STUDENT WISHING TO ATTEND SUMMER SCHOOL MUST PICK UP AN APPLICATION FORM AUTHORIZING ATTENDANCE AT SUMMER SCHOOL FROM THE GUIDANCE DEPARTMENT AT GEORGETOWN DISTRICT HIGH SCHOOL

Grades 9 to 12:

Central Peel District High School Board is continuing summer school this year at the Centennial Secondary School in Brampton. The purpose of this summer school is to offer additional assistance to students who wish to improve themselves. There are three areas in which they are offering courses.

A. An enrichment course. The purpose of this course is for students who have done well in school but are not able to take the courses offered in their own program. This is an excellent opportunity for students in these fields.

B. Improvement courses are being offered to students who have been promoted but are low in one or two subjects. The students will find difficulty in taking these subjects next year, and are strongly advised to take these at summer school. This would give a firm background to start fresh in September, and the marks earned will be used to revise the student's promotion marks.

C. Make-up courses are offered for those students who are below promotion standard in one or more subjects. This is an opportunity to save a full year in the student's educational life. Marks from these courses will be counted towards raising the student's promotion standard.

The Central Peel District High School Board has set this school up for the sole purpose of helping the students. As a result, they have only hired above-average teachers, and in most cases, department heads, to teach in this program.

I am very pleased to say that Central Peel District High School Board has again invited Georgetown District High School to participate in this program and we have gladly accepted. The summer school will be from July 2 to August 9 inclusive. Examinations will be held at the end. The marks will be returned to this high school and we will inform the students of the results.

Our students attending the summer school must take two, and only two, subjects and the fee for this course will be \$35, payable to the Central Peel District High School Board on the day of registration at Central Peel District High School. Registration will take place at Central Peel District High School, Kennedy Road and Highway No. 7, Brampton, on June 26, 27 and 28. The student MUST have a letter from the Principal.

Students recommended to take Improvement or Make-up courses will be notified by mail. Students wishing Enrichment courses, or feel that they should take Improvement or Make-up courses, but not notified before receiving their report card, should contact the Guidance Department.

The Georgetown District High School Board is offering free transportation to help the students. There will be a bus leaving the high school at 9 o'clock on June 27 to take students to Central Peel for registration, and will return as soon as the students are registered. Anyone wishing to register after that will have to find his own transportation to Central Peel.

The regular classes will be from 7 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. each day. Each class will be of 90 minutes duration, and will consist of 45 minutes of instruction,

followed by 45 minutes of supervised study. The bus will leave every morning from the Georgetown District High School at 8:30, and will leave Central Peel District High School at 12:30 each day, and return the students to the high school.

I am confident that the parents and students will recognize the value of this summer school and will cooperate in taking the maximum advantage of this offer.

The following are the courses in the three programs offered.

I. Section A: Enrichment - Two subjects required per student.

The following courses will be offered to students who have successfully completed the year's work with better than average standing. The courses are offered for the purpose of adding educational opportunities not available in the student's regular school course, and for the extension of interests in a particular subject area:

II. Section B: Improvement - Two subjects required per student.

The following courses will be offered to students who have been promoted, but who had low marks in one or two subjects. The summer course provides an opportunity for these students to improve their background and to gain confidence in the subjects. Examinations will be held at the end of the summer school.

COURSES OFFERED - 5 YEAR AND 4 YEAR

Grade 9 - English, History, Geography, Mathematics, Science, French, Typing I.

Grade 10 - English, History, Geography, Mathematics, Science, French, Latin, Bookkeeping I, Shorthand I.

Grade 11 - English, History, Mathematics, Geography, Physics, Latin, French.

Grade 12 - English, History, Mathematics, Chemistry, French, Latin, Geography, Economics.

(Credits towards a diploma will be given for these subjects.)

III. Section C - Make-up: Two subjects required per student. 4 and 5 year courses offered.

The following courses are offered to students who have failed in not more than three subjects of the year's work and whose mark in each of the subjects failed is 40 or more, and whose average on all subjects is not less than 50%.

Grade 9 - English, History, Geography, Mathematics, Science, French, Typing I.

Grade 10 - English, History, Geography, Mathematics, Science, French, Latin, Bookkeeping I, Shorthand I.

Grade 11 - English, History, Geography, Mathematics, Physics, Latin, French.

Grade 12 - English, History, Economics, Mathematics, Chemistry, French, Latin, Geography.

Grade 13:

Courses in Grade 13 subjects will be offered by Mississauga, Burlington, and Hamilton Boards. All three boards have agreed to accept our Grade 13 students. There will be NO transportation provided for these courses.

A Grade 13 student may only attend summer school if the subjects he is taking were taken this year but failed, and if the subjects will qualify him for a Secondary School Honour Graduation Diploma (7 credits.)

All students must arrange for summer school at the Guidance Department at Georgetown District High School before going to summer school.

MISSISSAUGA - will offer English, History, Geography, Mathematics A, Mathematics B, Physics, Chemistry, Biology, French, Latin.

registration is June 27 at Port Credit Secondary School from 1-4 p.m. and 7-9 p.m., and June 28 from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

registration forms to be obtained at Georgetown District High School before registration.

fees \$30 per student plus \$12 registration fee. Maximum of 2 credits per student.

school to operate from July 2 to August 9 from 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. daily.

BURLINGTON - will offer English, History, Mathematics A, Physics, Chemistry, Biology, French.

fees \$30 per subject, a maximum of 2 subjects per student.

school to operate from July 3 to August 9 from 8 a.m. to 12 noon at Nelson High School

HAMILTON - will offer English, Mathematics A, Mathematics B, Physics, Chemistry, Biology, History, Geography, French, Latin, German.

registration at Georgetown District High School.

fees \$30 per subject plus \$2 registration fee, a maximum of 2 subjects per student.

school will operate at Hamilton Collegiate Institute in the morning from July 15 to August 23.

Any student who wishes to enter this program is requested to contact the Guidance Department immediately.
