**Guided by Health Department Cemetery Board Tells Council**

Answering a complaint that flowers and wreaths were removed from a grave in Greenwood Cemetery, George Muckart and Harry Savings, chairman and secretary-treasurer of the Cemetery Board explained the incident to council Monday night.

A week ago, Bill Sunnucks complained to council, on behalf of the family of the late Glen Wright who died in a motor accident May 25th. Mr. Wright was a member of the Kinsmen Club, of which Mr. Sunnucks is president.

Both men said they were perturbed at press and radio publicity about the incident last week. Mr. Savings explained that the cemetery is governed by Dept. of Health regulations. Flowers had been left on the grave for 8 days, he said, then taken away, as regulations do not allow artificial wreaths in the summer months.

This, he said, is so the grounds can be kept in proper shape.

He said in over 2,000 burials since he has been employed at the cemetery, this was the first trouble of any kind. He said it is disturbing to himself and the staff to be subject to such criticism as took place at the council meeting.

Mayor Gibbons said council had erred in listening to the delegation and they should more properly have been referred to the Cemetery Board as management is vested in them.

Mr. Muckart said he is at a loss to understand why council didn't do this.

He said the board operates with a small staff. If council ran it there would be five men and a girl in the office handles 100 funerals a year and has 15 acres of grass to cut. Board and employees work hard to keep the cemetery in
