About 100 nurses from Halton and the surrounding area gathered at Oakville, Friday to take part in discussions and lectures concerning collective bargaining for nursing groups.

The nurses belong to the Registered Nurses' Association of Ontario — a group that has been described as the "fastest growing labour movement in Ontario." The public relations officer for the group is now Isabel LeBourdais — who wrote the best-selling book recently concerning the trial and conviction of Steve Truscott.

To date, there are 44 organized local nurses' associations in Ontario, which have negotiated 28 agreements.
