He pointed to Saskatchewan's plan for assisting released prisoners with the resulting drop in the number of repeaters.

"Guaranteed annual income may be worked two ways, through payment of a fixed amount or "negative income" tax" explaining workers earning less than a set amount would not be subject to full taxation.

He also advocated two kinds of plans, one for people who are unable to work, and one for those capable.

In his summary Kernighan charged both Liberals and Conservatives with "borrowing" planks from the NDP platform and lashed out at increasing foreign control of Canadian industries terming it a "threat to our nation."

Liberal, Rod Whiting, a salesman was last to speak. "You will decide three things June 25," he said. "Which of the three candidates in the riding will represent you; you will choose Trudeau or somebody else as your Prime Minister; and you will decide if you will have national unity."

He called the Progressive Conservatives "confused" saying Stanfield advocates one nation "while his lieutenant in Quebec says two nations."

Of his party's leader he said "We have seen his appeal all over Canada. In other countries students are revolting but in Canada today the young people are not protesting they're working for Mr. Trudeau."

He said Conservatives and New Democrats are preaching gloom and doom in prosperous times claiming "Canada is stronger today than ever."

"We're not making rash promises because the people don't want their taxes raised," he said. "It's true it is becoming increasingly difficult to buy a house, and while this is basically a provincial matter the federal government can still give leadership and financial assistance."

He pointed out that four billion dollars is the direct government contribution to housing, that there will be 175,000 houses started this year, and that 75 per cent of the people in Ontario own their own home.

Answering a heckler he said, "before we lower the interest rate we must find new sources of dollars," and proposed taxing land speculators heavily, and allowing home owners to deduct interest payments from their income tax.

He also advocated land purchases by the government, services installed, and the parcels sold to potential home owners at cost.

Obviously ruffled by McWilliams stressing Stanfield's "proven leadership" as Nova Scotia Premier, Whiting wiped at the marionettes. "Nice to visit but I wouldn't want to live there," he said of the eastern provinces.

McWilliams was introduced by John T. Armstrong, Kernighan by Jack Gillies, and Whiting by Ernest Rodnar.
