Debate Two-Year Term But Only Three Would Switch

During a heated and muddled debate on the two year term at Monday night's council meeting Cr. Steamer Emmerson indicated he was through with politics and would not run again.

"I'm not politicking," he replied to an accusation, "because I won't be here next year anyway," he commented in the middle of the discussion.

The motion to have a plebiscite on the two year term was triggered by a ratepayer, Steve Emmerson, demanding to know if the two year term was going to be rescinded or "are you going to keep on ignoring the wishes of the people" he challenged.

He reminded council the people had voted it down, then shortly afterwards council passed it anyway.

Mr. Emmerson then brandished the new ruling of giving advance notice to address council, as a banning of free speech.

On the motion for the plebiscite only the mayor, the reeve, and Cr. Emmerson voted for it.

Deputy Reeve Speight termed it a backward step, as he claimed no municipality anywhere around is on a one year term.

"A waste of time" was Cr. Smith's idea of the plebiscite. "If people don't like the members who voted for a two year term let them vote us out — I was one." He concluded by stressing the council made the decision and should either stick with it or they themselves rescind it.

Reeve Hunter admitted he preferred the two year term, but backed the motion because he felt it "should be a democratic vote."

According to Mayor Gibbons, if the by-law were rescinded before October 1st, the members would not be obliged to serve a two year term unless endorsed by the ratepayers in a vote.

The mayor, a strong opponent to the two year term, stated it ran contrary to public opinion. "If you are sincere, we should rescind the present by-law right away" he concluded.

"I wonder if members of council have asked themselves why the public are opposed to the two year term" asked Cr. Bob Francis. "I think it shows no council over the past fifteen years has captured the confidence of the voters."

Earlier in the evening, the same subject was brought up by Jim McCarig who produced an election card belonging to the mayor.

"You say on this you're opposed to the two year term, and ask for one more year service so that you can be mayor throughout Centennial year, I'd like to hear your excuses, and why you did not keep your word" he challenged.

"The explanation might be that I would have caused an election if I quit," retorted the mayor.

Planning Extension to Town's Public Library

A resolution from Georgetown Library Board informing council they intended to hire an architect to design an extension of the present library at a cost of \$1,500 found little favour in council on Monday.

The Library Board claimed they had determined most library members preferred an extension at the present site to any other plan.

Deputy Reeve Speight advised the Board to seek OMB approval before spending any money.

"If they get as much consideration from the OMB as we did" opined Cr. Emmerson, "we know what will happen."

Mayor Gibbons asked if there was not a library included in the million dollar addition to the high school. "I'm sure the library board know the facts, and know we oppose any addition to this particular building" concluded the mayor.

Need Appointment for Council Appearance

Georgetown council last week adopted a new procedure for dealing with delegations at council meetings.

Until now, a ratepayer may speak to council merely by arriving at the meeting at 8 p.m.

Now it is necessary to notify the town clerk, C.G. Benham, in writing before 5:00 p.m. on the Thursday preceding a meeting, stating the subject a person wishes to present. This enables councillors to obtain information on the submission in order to deal with it more effectively.

Copies of such notices will be written or typed copy of a submission must be filed with the clerk immediately after any submission is made at a meeting.

The motion parallels some what a procedure which council adopted a few years ago, then discarded in favour of a return to the "free" system.

Only one councillor, Robert Francis, opposed the new procedure when it was voted in last week.

While no official word regarding the matter of bus routes has been revealed at council, a motion authorizing the town foreman to reimburse parking meters in front of Joe's Tuck Shop and Eaton's store to provide a proper bus stop for Gray Coach and Georgetown Transportation Co. indicated the change has been finalized.

No comment was given the motion, except an "unusually loud" "I'm opposed" from the mayor.

District Woman Pilot in Coast To Coast Race

Mrs. Barbara Brotherton of Limehouse will co-pilot TARA No. 46 in the forthcoming All-Woman Transcontinental Air race, more commonly known as the Powder Puff Derby, July 6 to 8. Entrants will take off from Van Nuys, California, and finish the race in Savannah, Georgia. Mrs. Brotherton is teamed with Mrs. Ruth Bliss of Chappaqua, N.Y.

Mrs. Bliss' first airplane ride years ago in a penny resulted in her obtaining her own license in 1959. She now has a commercial ticket with an instrument rating and 1800 hours in the air. She performs air taxi work for Rockland Air Equipment Co., Spring Valley, N.Y. and is currently president of Westchester Children's Association in White Plains. Elliott Bliss her husband, is an investment broker in New York City they have three children.

Mrs. Brotherton's first taste of flying came in 1942, with her husband, in an aerobatic aircraft — she obtained her license also in 1959. A teacher for many years, she is presently teaching Air Rangers and leads a 4-H group.

Mrs. Brotherton has a private license and 350 hours flying experience. She is married to Thomas Brotherton, manager of Economy Forms, Georgetown plant, and they have two children.

Both women will be flying in their second AWTAR in a Piper Cherokee, rated at 180 h.p.

Start Addition to Christian School

Construction started yesterday on an addition to Georgetown Christian School on 10th Line of Esquesing.

The project will add two classrooms and washroom facilities on the south side of the school. They will be ready for September when the school expects an enrolment of between 130 and 190 pupils.

Georgetown Christian School opened three years ago with 100 pupils. The building program two years ago brought the total number of classrooms to five.

In the fall the school's teaching staff will total six an increase of one. The staff includes one part-time member. The addition is being constructed by VanDerMeer Construction at a cost of \$31,300. The money was raised from the school society membership through a funds drive.

Whiting Wins with Large Majority in First Attempt

Halton's Rud Whiting shared in the Liberal sweep Tuesday which returned the federal government to office with a comfortable majority.

Mr. Whiting, in his first bid for office, had a commanding 5,300 majority over his closest rival Progressive-Conservative Peter McWilliams. Whiting's total was 17,859 and McWilliams' 12,576. NDP candidate Murray Kernighan was third with 6554.

The trend was reflected in Georgetown and Esquesing. In town, results were 2562, 1660 and 1010. In the township it was 1451, 1125 and 578.

Results are unofficial and include advance polls. The official count will be tallied on Saturday.

Mr. Whiting, an Oakville salesman, will succeed Dr. Harry Harley in the next parliament. Dr. Harley did not stand for nomination this year, after representing Halton for three terms of Ottawa. He had a majority of 8801 in 1965, in a 4-man race.

The Liberals, with Prime Minister Pierre Trudeau at the helm, made outstanding gains in Ontario where such prominent candidates as Dalton Camp, Wallace McCutcheon, and Earl Brownridge failed in a P-C bid.

With possibility of a few changes when final returns are in, Canada's next parliament will have 153 Liberals, 73 Conservatives, 22 NDP and 15 Creditistes among its members.

The Millar purse is for \$50,000 and will be preceded by the Millar 200 Club Pro-Am on July 2 for an additional \$10,000 including the 1968 Millar event held a record setting \$100,000 event.

The 40th annual Millar will be held July 4, 5 and 6.

Miss Norma, Al Biddle, Alvie Thompson, Ken Grant, A. J. McVee and Bill Whiting will be among the Canadian Entables who'll cut off Tuesday at noon, and many of the top pros entered will be in action for Georgetown to find, use themselves with the local course as soon as they wind up the Quebec Open.

Monday, Carling and the Ontario branch of the CPGA held a press day at Georgetown Golf & Country Club when district reporters attended an informal lunch and round the course on themselves prior to the Millar.

On the same day, first pro Doug Sinclair, North Hutton's Pete Carter, Chuganous', Gar Vasey, and Trafalgar's Roy McDonald, Terra Cotta, graduated from Macdonald Institute University of Guelph, and received her B.B. Sc. degree at the recent convocation. She is a graduate of Streetsville District High School.
