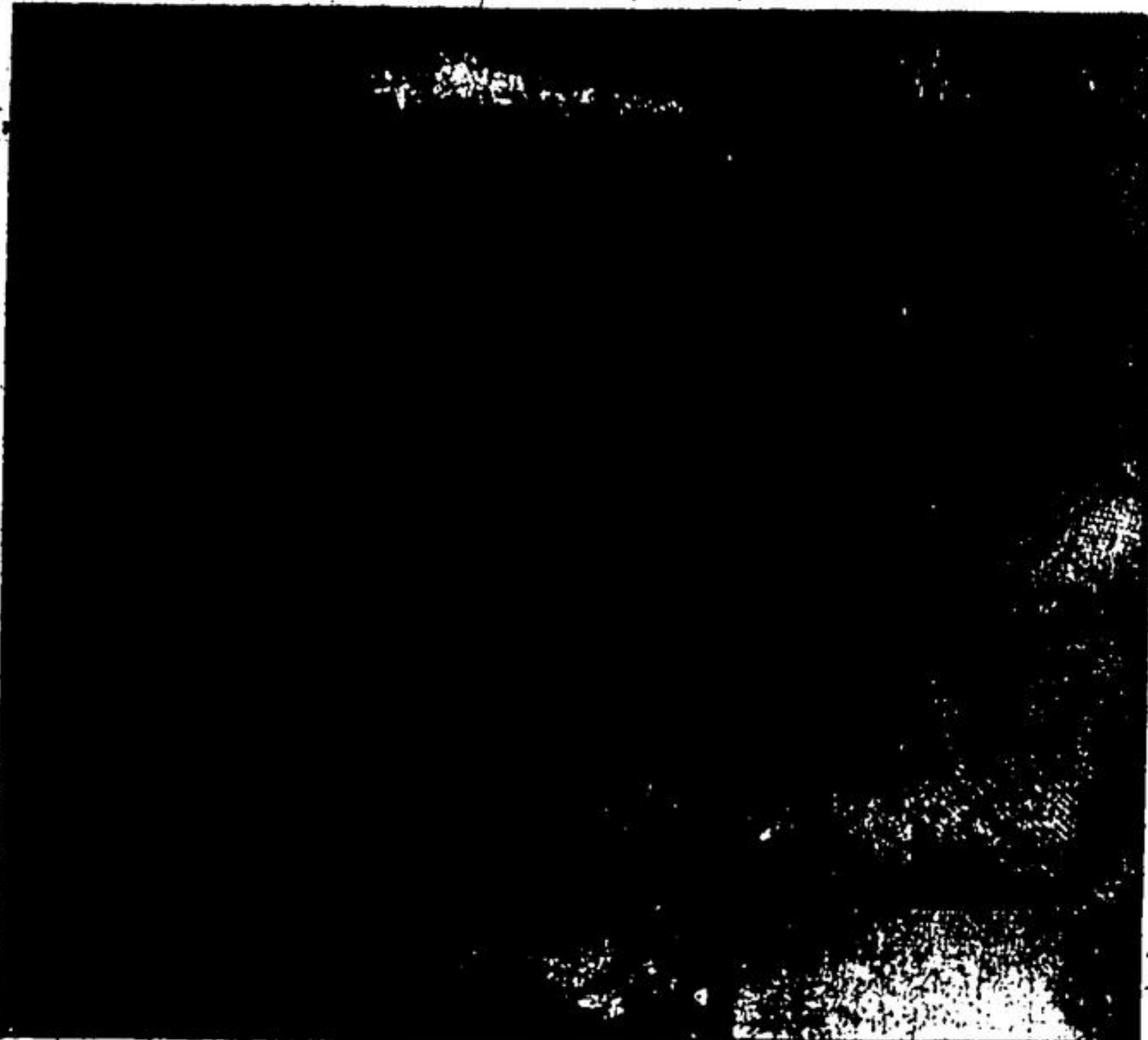


ARENA REMODELLING
