

"Represent All" is Pledge Of New M.P. Rud Whiting

Haltom's new M.P. Rod Whiting who flew to Ottawa on Dominion Day will return tomorrow for a victory celebration at the Riviera Norval.

"This is a big moment in my life," he said of his success in the federal election June 23.

After his victory, Whiting immediately pledged himself to representing everyone in Haltom, regardless of party affiliation, and said he intends to work on committees dealing with housing, consumer affairs, transportation and eastern agriculture.

"The only time it makes any difference if you are a Liberal on election day. From here on it does not matter what your politics are, I represent all the people of this riding," he said.

He said one of the top priorities of the Liberal government is housing, pointing out that he made several points about the issue during his election campaign.

"I will be taking them to Ottawa with me. I hope something will be implemented," he said.

Dr. Harry Harley said he has already cleaned out his desk at the House of Commons. Harley was one of the first to congratulate the MP along with defeated Progressive Conservative candidate Peter McWilliams and Halton East MPP Jim Snow.

"Very many people have worked long and hard hours on my behalf — people of all ages. I am most appreciative to each and every one of them," Whiting said.

"I worked hard to get nominated and I worked very hard to be elected — but I realize that my job is just beginning. I will work as hard and harder to represent the people of the riding the way they want to be represented."

The new MP said it was foolhardy to name all the Liberals who had supported his campaign but paid special tribute to his campaign manager, Bob Blake.

Said Blake "I have worked for a good candidate. It's always easy to work for a candidate like Rud Whiting."

Conflicting Views on Hall-Dennis Report

Dear Sir,

For a second time in two weeks I must protest against your editorials. Again you utter a reactionary cry against proposals raised by the Hall-Dennis Report to the Government on Education.

"Unlike yourself, sir, I have received nothing but favourable comments and phone calls concerning this report and my letter of last week. I feel that your observations that the vast majority of people aren't in favour, but strongly against this report is erroneous. Far more likely is it that the majority of the population is quite unmoved, as yet, by the report."

However, may I suggest that before anyone makes a firm stand on this report they should become thoroughly informed on the matter and be quite certain they know what they are talking about. Firstly, of course, they should read, reread and be thoroughly conversant with all 221 pages of this report.

Secondly, they should visit some of the schools in Ontario and see for themselves how different education is today from what it was ten years ago, let alone twenty or more years that exist in most people were a part of the school system. Incidentally they might also try living on an Indian reserve to understand some of the problems that the authors of this report have to say about the education of the Indian children.

Thirdly they might try looking at the world through the eyes of a child — they would find that our "comfortable, secure world" looks very uncomfortable and very insecure and very huddled to a great many children. And don't blame this on the children, it is the adult world which has provided this environment. Therefore it is terribly important that the child's viewpoint on education be realized and examined; I might recommend studying pages 44 and 45 of the report especially in this connection.

Once again I would urge that before your readers flood Mr. Snow's office with letters of protest they should read the report in its entirety, study the problem thoroughly and then come to a mature judgement.

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Witnesses to Kitchener For District Assembly

The Georgetown congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses will not be conducting its usual program of meetings this week. The announcement was made Sunday by Mr. Melville Taylor, presiding minister of the group. All will be attending the "Good News for All Nations" District Assembly of Jehovah's Witnesses at Kitchener commencing Thursday, July 4.
