

## Next Generation's Fate In Adult Hands: Perrott

"Adults have a great responsibility in education. They have the fate of the next generation in their hands and can make it a wonderful generation or self-destructing." Holy Cross separate school principal Richard C. Perrott told the Georgetown Local Council of Women when he addressed them Friday.

He stressed certain standards must be set to give youth the chance of becoming decent, happy adults of tomorrow. "We must preach love, not hate and killing; building, not destroying; help, and assistance to the less fortunate rather than indifference and intolerance," he said.

Mr. Perrott told his audience that children need love, physical and mental, and to realize that their teacher loves each one of them. "She or he may not always like them, but she still loves them," he claimed.

"There are far too few teachers who really love children, and are in the profession for other reasons."

He also claimed children should be given respect as human beings, and an increasing role in self government and responsibility.

"The function of education is to allow a person to obtain a livelihood, but also allow him to develop as an acceptable and responsible member of society, and to achieve a happy and full use of work hours and leisure hours," he said.

Mr. Perrott said education

should develop the whole man. It should be physical, mental, social, religious and emotional.

Of schools he said "It should be a centre for all parts and age groups of the community, used around the clock when necessary, a resource centre for information of all kinds — book films, TV discussion and resource programs.

"The place of the old box type classroom with its static rows of desks holding nice quiet types of nice tidy children, doing all the same nice problems and being thoroughly bored is on the way out. In its place will be a complex of variable interest areas, less formal methods of holding classes, and a variety in seating, or lying or standing."

Of teachers Mr. Perrott said: "No amount of book learning will make a teacher. A teacher has to be a special kind of person, with a minimum of three years' university course with emphasis on child psychology and child development."

He advocates a single salary schedule based on training and experience stating that teachers must not be segregated into levels of teaching anymore than the student should be bound to rigid categorization.

Of the children he said: "All children are different and must therefore be educated differently to achieve their maximum return — already we have classes for the handicapped and ret-

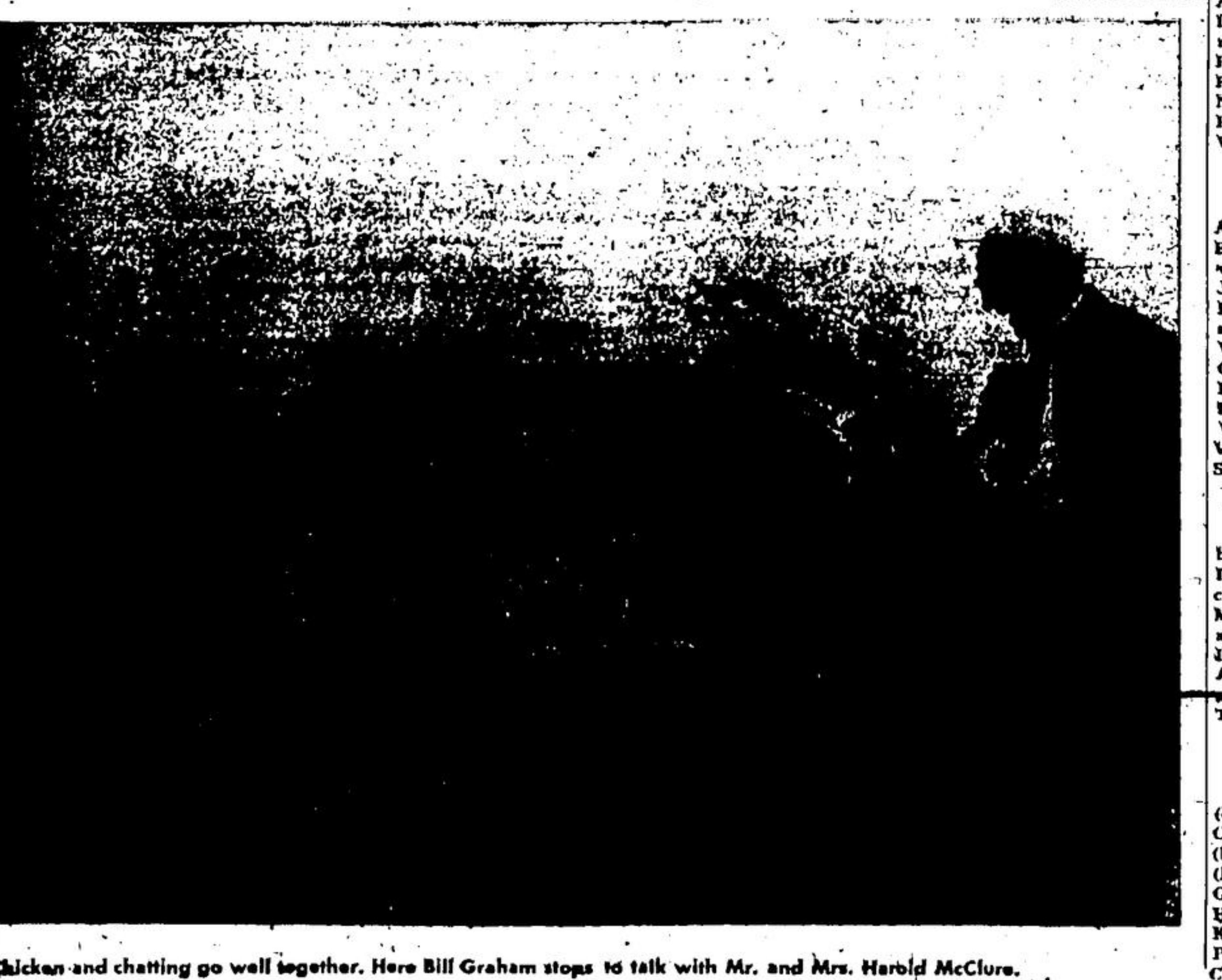
Coffee and tea were in big demand because of the cool weather and kept those in this department on the hop. All families in the church worked hard during the day and helped make the project a success.
