### Denies Cheque Delayed For Newspaper Publicity

Haltom East MPP Jim Snow said this week that at the most there could only have been a two-day delay in turning over to the county a cheque for \$200,000.

The cheque was a payment from the province to the county to help pay off the last expansion at the Haltom Centennial Manor in Milton.

Oakville Deputy Reeve Bill Gillies, who sits on county council, said that Snow had delayed the cheque for a week so he could arrange a publicity photograph of himself and county officials receiving the cheque.

The photo appeared in several county papers including the Herald.

Gillies claimed the county had to pay \$40 interest per day on the loan that the cheque would help repay.

"I got the cheque late on a Friday afternoon," Snow said, "and it was turned over to the county Wednesday morning."

Two Days

Snow said that if the cheque had been mailed to Milton, it would have arrived in time to go in the bank Monday afternoon. As it was, it was turned over Wednesday morning, and put in the bank in the afternoon — so it was only held up two days.

Snow explained that county clerk administrator Garfield Brown had contacted him in March of this year, and advised him that the county still had more than \$200,000 coming to it in provincial grants on the Manor expansion.

But the county could not apply for this final grant Snow said because the final figures of the cost of construction were still not in. Brown asked him, Snow said, to see if the province could pay \$200,000 of the grant to reduce the amount the county was paying interest on. The county had borrowed money to pay for the construction, until the provincial grant was received.

Snow said he discussed this with Queen's Park officials, and it was agreed that this payment would be made, with the rest to come later when the final cost was known.

On April 11, Snow said, an order in council was passed to authorize payment of the cheque. Two and a half weeks are usually required, he added, to process the cheque through the treasury department.

The cheque then went to the Department of Family and Social Services and was cleared through that department, Snow said.

On Friday, May 17, the minister of the department John Snider, he added, asked him if he could take it to the county, Snow said.
