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Decide on Air Cadets Squadron for Georgetown

This is yet another project to add to the long list of community efforts the Branch is concerned with.

We feel this project is a worthy challenge to the Branch and that those involved will be ambitious and determined enough to make a successful undertaking of it.

LEARNED TO FLY

Some facts regarding the Air Cadets, the Air Cadet movement was founded in 1941, since then, 225,000 young Canadians have shared in the benefits of Air Cadet training. 132,000 Cadets have enjoyed summer camps at Canadian Forces Bases, 6,900 cadets have learned to fly, 3,300 have received leadership and career training through special full time courses during the summer months, 1200 young Canadians have toured countries in Europe, and the USA. As good will ambassadors, this is to promote international friendship and to award top cadets.

All this adds up to aviation and citizenship training to Georgetown Youth, which will be firmly endorsed by all civic minded members.

THE BACK BONE

The squadron will be under the command of Comrade Rod MacDonald ex-RCAF, the sponsoring committee which is often called the Back Bone of the Air Cadet Movement consists of three members of the Branch appointed by president HRO. They are the Branch PRO, Bob MacKenzie and Russ Stephens.

Rod MacDonald will have three other commissioned ranks to assist him.
