

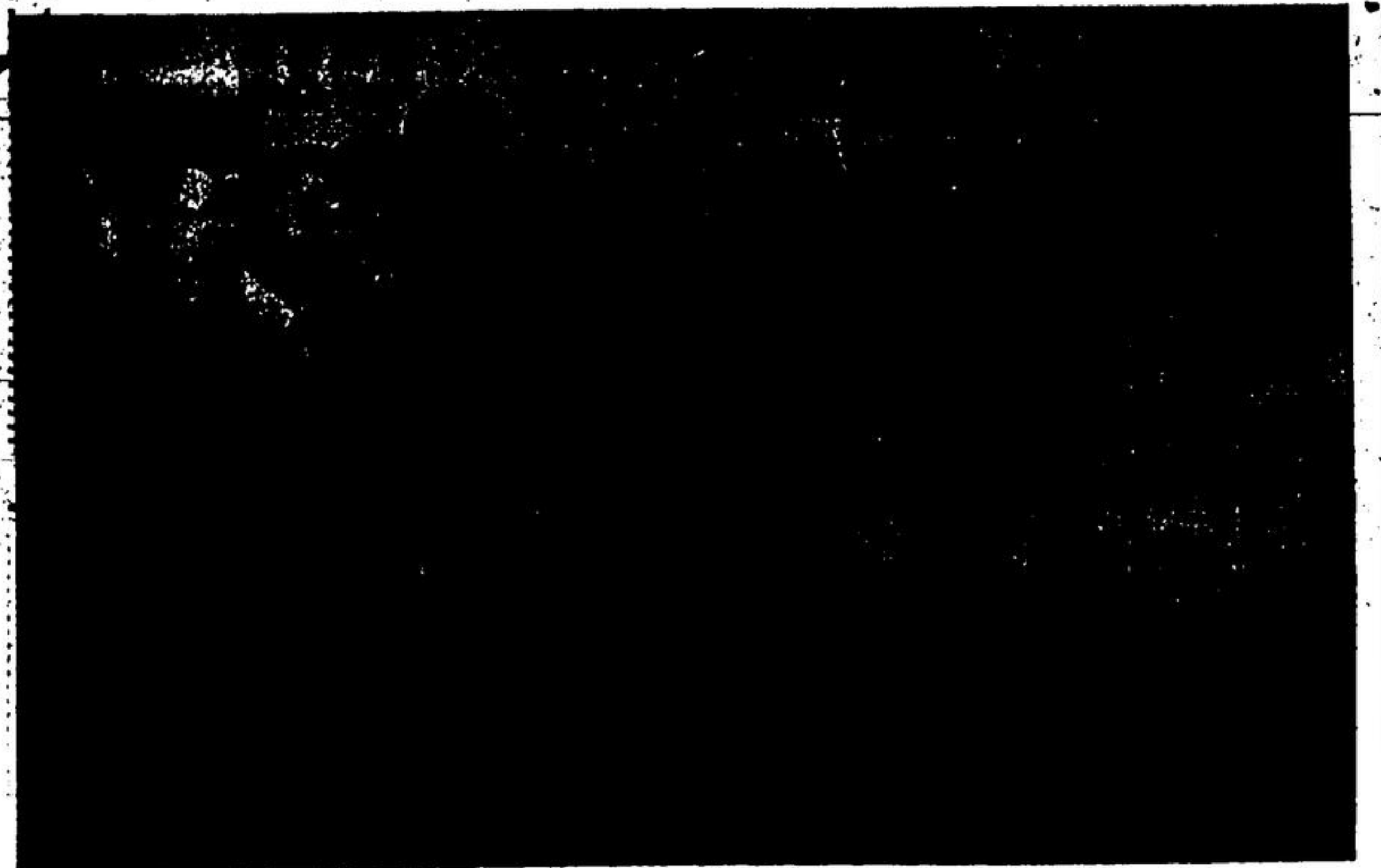
### Halton Hills Residents Form Ratepayers Group

**Education Editorials Student 'Cold' Leave This Young**

Sir: Your editorials of this week and the week previous leave me cold. You have advocated the maintenance of an education system that was outdated a half century ago. In editorials before them you advocated further regressive measures.

Perhaps it is easy for you, an adult long out of school, to reflect favorably on 'school days'. It is easy for you, a conformist well established in The System, to say that your schooling brought you this 'successy'.

But it is difficult for the student. It is difficult for the person who daily, against his will, is forced to learn (temporarily) a set of facts which is outdated. It is hard for that person to believe that this mass of figures, generalizations, rules have any bearing on his future in a world which recognizes figures, generalizations, rules only for their temporary value.

It is hard to find one's self in an impersonal world created by the bearers of figures, generalizations, rules. Some of us who might, conceivably, leave some meaningful mark on the progress of the world, are brought up as little machines, conforming to the principles of the past, frustrated in our first attempts at individuality by the education system. And we wind up egging out an existence at the mill.

We are brought up in a system of pass and you pass, fail and you are finished. Why is everything so negative. We are not inspired to learn, rather threatened ugly consequences if we don't; we aren't encouraged to succeed, just verbally and physically mauled if we fail. We are strapped, failed and bored into conformity, giving no opportunity to develop a real individualism which will carry us through to success, an individualism more encompassing than 'self discipline' — which is but one aspect of character. From the first moments the evil sprouts of person-

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ality appear they are destroyed — some, like 'little weeds' are persistent, consistently sprouting anew, consistently cut to the roots until after a series of frustrations they die.

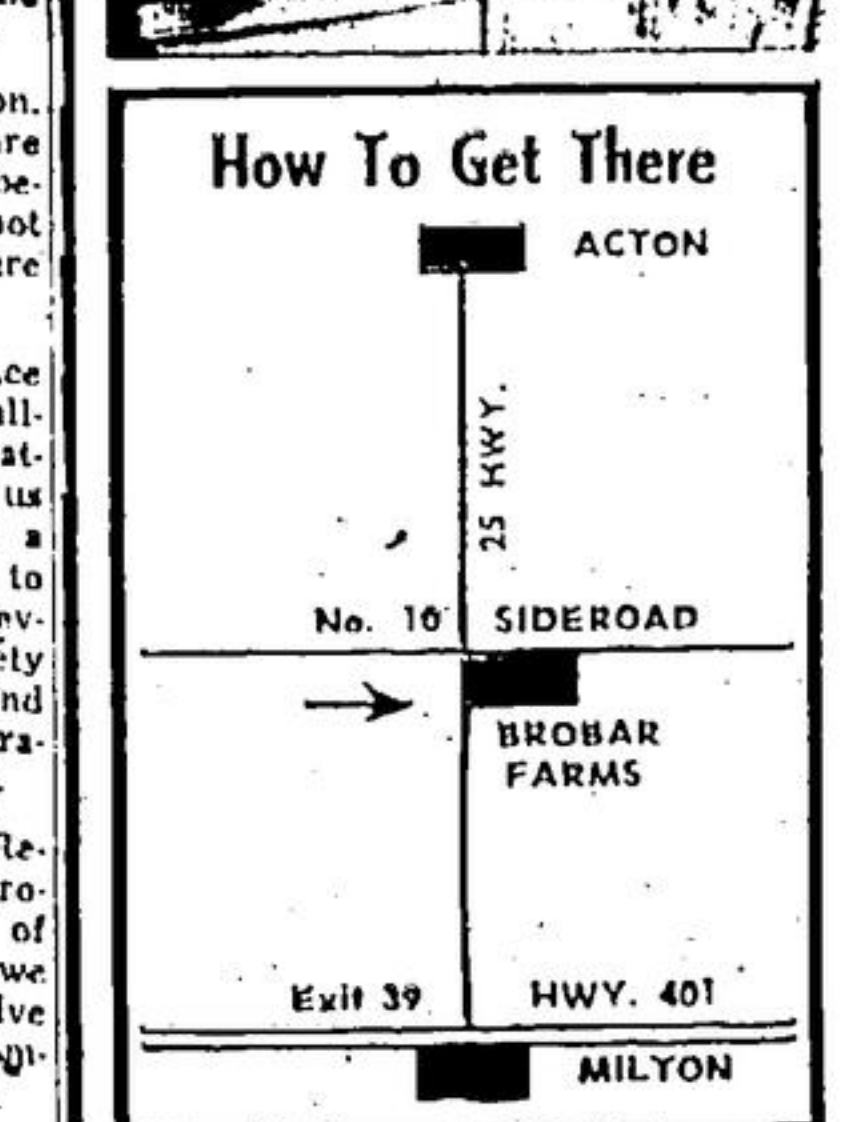
We riot out of frustration. Frustration, because we are regimented, not organized; because we are spoonfed; not left to explore; because we are programmed and not taught.
