Conservation Happening

Everything from Sky Diving To Trap Shooting on Program

A brainwave of Halton Liberal candidate Rud Whiting has captured the imagination of hundreds of people. As a result the first gala week of activities to be sponsored by a conservative group in Ontario.

Over 30 community service groups have pitched in to back Halton Region Conservation Authority in an ambitious program designed to woo public interest in conservation work.

The authority has designated July 8-14 as Conservation Week in Halton.

"The idea has been enthusiastically supported by all those approached" an authority spokesman said.

All Ages
"Planned to stimulate public awareness and support of conservation goals in Halton and to involve the public in dreams for the future, Conservation Week will appeal to all ages."

The week's program started off with an official opening ceremony for Mountsberg Conservation area, performed by J.C. Thatcher, deputy minister of energy and resources management for Ontario.

Mountsberg Wildlife Preserve described by the authority as its most original wildlife conservation project, contains a 500 acre reservoir created by a dam project.

A home for 20 varieties of birds, foxes deer and other animals, the farm is also experimenting with the winter feeding of fowl.

Friday, July 12, will be Adventure Day at the Kelso Dam Conservation Area.

The day will include a giant outdoor picnic, coupled with lessons on how to be at home in the wilderness.

New Sport
Youngsters will be taught a new sport — orienteering—and tour the Niagara Escarpment and the Halton County Museum.

Instruction in the new sport will be headed by professor Alex Peepre of the department of physical education at Guelph University, and the Ontario Orienteering Association.

It is expected that over 200 boys and girls will take part in the program. The authority describes orienteering as "the art of wilderness familiarity with map and compass."

Kelso pool staff has organized a swimming competition for the afternoon.

Saturday will be called Sport sman's Day at Rattlesnake Point and Kelso Dam, when professor Peepre will instruct 60 people in orienteering. The Bruce Trail Association will be conducting hikes.

Trap Shooting
Saturday afternoon will start with a bang as Halton Sportsman Club opens an invitational trap shoot. Eight-man teams will compete in a 25 clay-bird contest for a trophy.

Meanwhile, at Kelso, there will be gun safety demonstrations, and fly-casting instruction.

Oakville Humane Society will hold water-bug dog races on Kelso beach from 1:30 p.m. Any one can enter. The two classes will include dogs over 40 lbs. and pooches under 40 lbs.

They will be released by a handler and his master will row beside him as he paddles through the course. Prizes are offered along with meals for the dogs.

Probably the most spectacular event will be a sky-diving Sport Parachute Club Children will enjoy water sports.

Hundreds of anglers will take part in a trout derby organized by Halton Sportsman Club and \$80 worth of prizes are in the offing. Local Scouts will operate a bait concession during the day.

For the Sunday wrap up to the gala activities, includes wandering bands, canoe races, a children's art display and more sky-diving demonstrations.

Kelso pool staff will demonstrate water rescue and artificial resuscitation techniques at 2:30 p.m.

At the end of the day the Ministerial Association of North Halton will close off the week's activities with a sunset worship service for all denominations, starting at 5 p.m.

The service will take place on the scenic Kelso hillside, overlooking Glen Eden Lake. Dress will be informal.
