

Homenuik's 209 Garners \$1200 Millar Prize Money

Wilf Homenuik of Winnipeg must have seen Bonnie and Clyde. The prairie belter slipped into Georgetown and left Saturday \$1700 richer. About \$500 of his haul was picked up Wednesday in the Pro-Am tournament at Georgetown Golf and Country Club, and the rest came Saturday when he stole the Carling Millar Championship from Gary Bowerman in the final round.

He had been two strokes behind Bowerman who had tied him for the second round lead after 14 holes but rallied with birdies on the final two holes. Bowerman took extra strokes on three of his final four holes. Bowerman said he developed a case of the 'shakes' in the late stages. He finished with a final round 74 and a 54 hole total of 212 to collect \$500 for his second place finish.

Ken Deggan, Frank Whibley, and Gary Slatter, all of Toronto, finished in a three way tie for third place with 213 total and \$225 of the \$6000 total money. Gary Fawcett and Jerry Magee, both of Toronto, followed at 214.

Help offered Ken Chilvers of Glen Eagles by a little brown dog wasn't allowed. The dog picked up his second shot on the 18th and ran to the green with it — a nice gesture, but the ball had to be replaced.

That severe thunder storm Friday afternoon will long be remembered by Stan Goughly of Lambton, Jack Kay of Rosedale, and Herb Helzschler of Thunderbird. They were all jolted mildly by a bolt of lightning while on the course.

Tourney winner Wilf Homenuik collected his fourth pay cheque in eight days when he accepted the Millar money. He won \$230 at the Quebec Open, \$110 at Bay of Quinte, \$541 in the Pro-Am plus the \$1,200 Saturday.

Aler. Lane Apartment Bids Get Little Council Support

Two proposed 44 suite apartments on Mountainview Road near Campbell Gate were turned down by council for a second time at Monday's meeting.

And the previous week, a proposal by Bob Lane for an apartment on property at the foot of Edward Street was also mixed by council.

Opposition by residents has been a prime factor in delaying the Aler Investment proposal for Mountainview. On Monday council debated a possible traffic problem, then switched to generalities about overloading the sewage system if the apartments were built.

Cr. Ballentine, who with Deputy Reeve Spight and Cr. Smith was the only supporter in the vote, disputed Cr. John Hole's assertion that there would be 222 cars a day exiting on Campbell Gate.

One suite would exit on Sargent Road, he said, and both would feed into Mountainview, which is not a residential street at that point.

Cr. Smith said residents knew when they located in an R4 area that they would have commercial development.

Cr. Francis fears that the apartments would mean a half million dollar extension to the sewage disposal plant, but Mr. Spight said this is not a valid objection, as an extension is in the books regardless.

Town Joins Township Seeks Senior Apartments

Georgetown council on Monday voted to ask Ontario Housing Corporation to provide a 24 unit apartment for senior citizens.

Esqueuing council made a similar move last week, following explanation of the plan by OHC officials to the two councils.

OHC will finance the project completely, with the municipality guaranteeing a tax charge of no more than \$25 yearly per unit.

Land, acquired by the Kinsmen Club two years ago for a similar project is the potential location of the building. It will be in the township, close to Georgetown hospital, and will serve applicants from both municipalities.
