Georgetown will be represented when a team of top Canadian track and field athletes make an European tour in late July and early August.

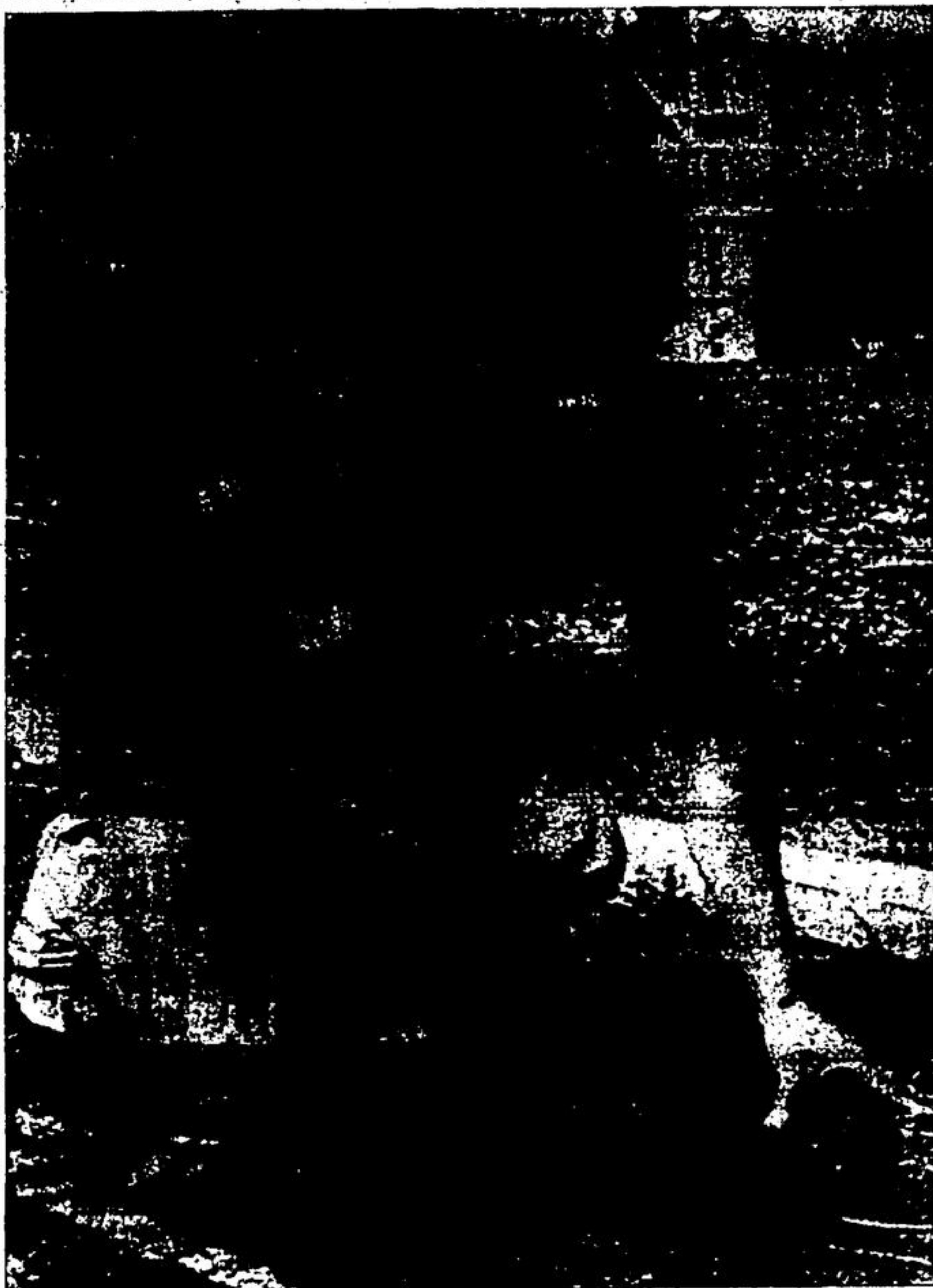
Tony Powell of 4 Chipper Court, was named to the men's team following his standout performance in the recent meet promoted by Bill Crothers in the Canadian National Exhibition

Marilyn Eagles went the entire game on the rubber, while her mates tagged Hornby hurlers Schreiber and McGrath for 23 hits.

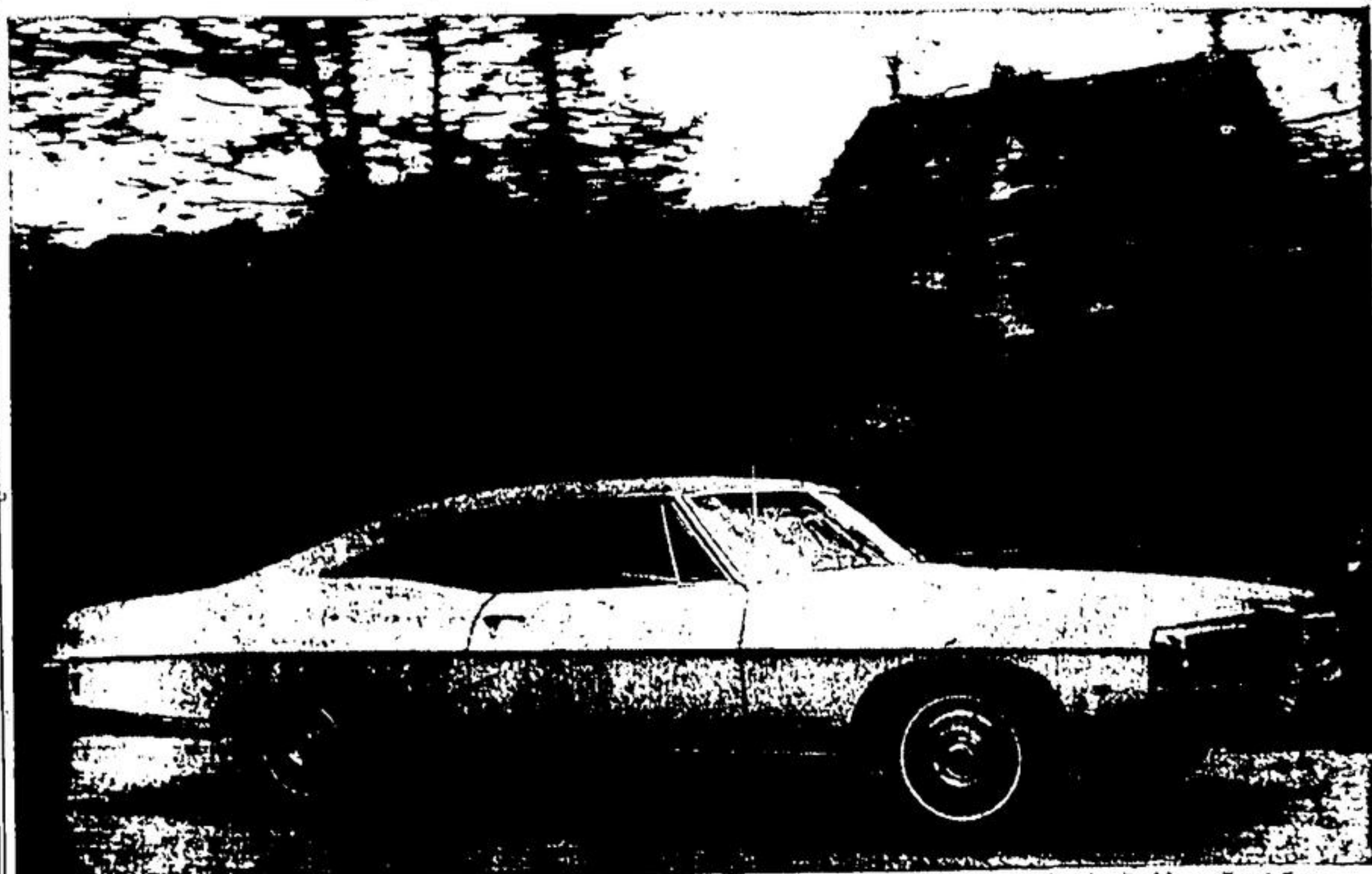
Georgettes went to town in the fourth inning and piled up six runs to open the lead Hornby never closed.
