

Milton Council Insists Hilton Falls Dam First

Hilton Falls dam project must get under way before the Scotch Block scheme. Milton town council meeting as a committee of the whole, told Hilton Region Conservation Authority.

Milton council is the only one of eight area municipalities to put a stumbling block before the Scotch Block dam, which will be located north of Milton just west of Highway 25, near the escarpment.

Councillor Colin Smillie told authority officials recently, "When we say we want Hilton Falls started first, there's no problem with Scotch Block."

FIVE YEARS
Councillor Gordon Krantz said council wanted an assurance that Hilton Falls would get under way as early as possible or it might be "another five or ten years or more" before it was complete. Hilton Falls is north of the Kelsa area, which is near Highway 401, west of Milton.

According to conservation delegate Allan Wright, Burlington representative, all other area municipalities involved in the scheme have agreed on both projects.

"Only Milton is holding us up" he said afterwards.

Earlier he told council: "If Hilton Falls does not get off the ground it will be disastrous to the area." He said the authority was ready to go on both projects.

The authority is seeking the backing of member municipalities before an August 28 Ontario Municipal Board hearing in Toronto.

Brock Harris, another conservation delegate to the meeting, said: "Nassagaweya has approved it. There are five other municipalities which approved this dam (Scotch Block) without any hesitation at all — and they will get no immediate advantage from it."

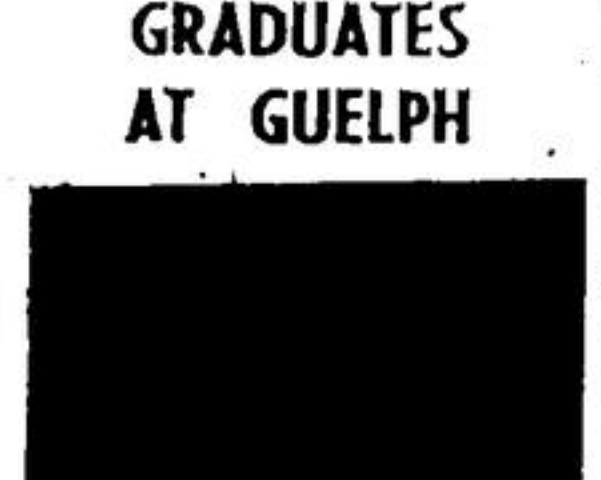
HILTON FIRST
"We are not against Scotch Block, we want Hilton Falls first," said Cr. Smillie.

"Scotch Block should have priority over Hilton Falls," added councillor Krantz.

The authority will now be going to the OMB with the backing of Scotch Block from everyone involved except Milton council.

Mr. Wright reminded council that the authority had not fallen down on its projects. "We have carried them out and we have been faithful to our citizens," he added.

"We are here to protect the rights of the citizens of this town," retorted councillor Smillie. "And this is precisely what we are doing."

Hilton Falls is intended to provide the future water supply of Milton and Campbellville. It is estimated to cost \$480,000 exclusive of land and engineering costs.

LARGE LAKE
Latest plans call for a 55-acre lake containing about 1200 acre-feet of water.

It is to be built on Beaver Dam Creek north of Highway 401 just west of Milton and is to be a sister dam to Kelso and the proposed Scotch Block dam to be located in the Hornby area on a branch of the 16 Mile Creek.

Milton council wants the Hilton Falls scheme to begin within four months, despite the authority's evidence that land acquisition is not progressing as easily or quickly as expected.

Gastle Family in Canada Since 1830

Over One-Third More Students In Summer School This Season

BRAMPTON — Enrolment in Central Peel District High School Board's summer school program is up to 491 this year, an increase of 123 over last year's total of 368, reports Don Lawson, principal of the school.

Classes are being conducted at Brampton Centennial Secondary School on McMurchy Avenue South.

"Most of the students, each of whom is allowed a two-subject maximum, are trying to boost failing marks, but some are there to improve passing marks," said Mr. Lawson.

Students who are residents of the Central Peel school district pay \$20 for the course while those out of the area pay \$35.

J.E. Huggins, business administrator of Central Peel District High School Board, said, "This program costs the taxpayer \$71.12 per student in contrast to the \$957 per student over the regular year."

"If this summer cost is deducted from the full cost of repeating a student who has failed, a successful campaign at summer school represents considerable savings to us."
