Nassagaweya has a new township crest, thanks to the efforts of a local artist, Elizabeth Wilkos Hoey.

Mrs. Hoey, a member of the Arts and Crafts of Georgetown and wife of Nassagaweya deputy reeve William Hoey, of Mofat, has designed the crest which will be used on township stationery and in a wall plaque in the municipal office at Brookville.

A Latin motto 'In Pace Laborat' (Labour In Peace) appears across the top of the shield with Township of Nassagaweya across the bottom.

Widow of a Saskatchewan M.P.P., Mrs. Christine Guitrey Given, 90, died at Halton Centennial Manor, Milton on July 14th.

Mrs. Given, a native of Ligtowel, met Nathaniel Given when she was living in Saskatchewan. A hardware merchant there, he served as a Conservative member of Rosetown riding in the provincial legislature.

They later lived in Delisle, returned to Ontario some years ago to live in Toronto, then moved to Georgetown which was Mr. Given's home community. He died here in 1950.

Mrs. Given was active in women's organizations at St. John's United Church. Several years ago she moved to Milton to make her home at Halton Manor.

She leaves one sister, Mrs. Roy Hastings of Listowel, a nephew Earl Hastings, Listowel and niece Muriel Hastings, Listowel and Mrs. T. Hurst, Atwood. She was predeceased by sisters Mrs. Russel Riddell and Emma Buttery.

Recalls Pioneer Western Days on 86th Birthday

Neighbours of Mrs. Henry Lyons called at her home in Naicam, Saskatchewan on May 4th to help her celebrate her 86th birthday.

A lunch was served by her daughters-in-law, Mary and Stanis, while stories of pioneer days were told—how prairie fires were fought; hunting coyotes and black bear, deer and wild ducks, prairie chickens and geese; and enduring temperatures of 60 below for a week at a time.

Mrs. Lyons told how she came through a stormy voyage 85 years ago from Ireland to land in Canada on May 3rd. They expected the ship to sink one night as waves 30 feet high rose and fell over them. They landed safely in Toronto.

She was a student at Georgetown high school and Toronto Normal, and was principal of Norval public school for four years, 1903 to 1907 and at Terra Cotta for a year and a half.

She enjoys receiving letters still from many of her pupils of those days.

Two rose bushes were planted in Mrs. Lyons' honour on her birthday. The happy day came to a close with singing of some old time hymns.
