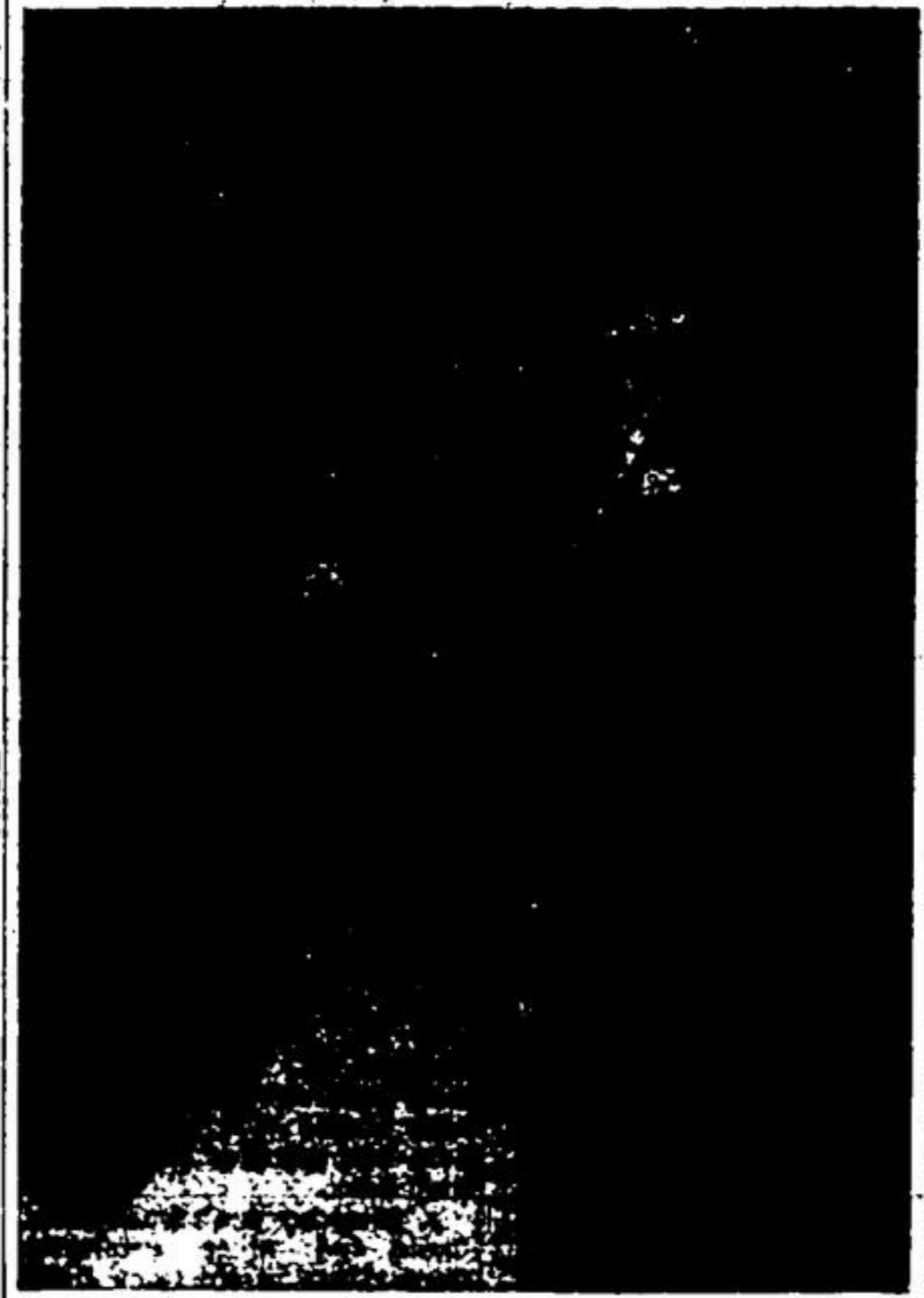

Plan for Rosslake Future Air Strip

RR. 3, Georgetown,
Dear Mr. Editor:
I sincerely appreciate the space given in your paper and your interest shown in its publication. There seemed to be no other way to bring these problems out in the open, come what may. The Health Unit has informed the Attorney General of my action, and as yet I have not heard from them.

There are personal reasons why I delayed in my attempt to be reinstated. Chief among these was an eyesight problem. In 1963 I knew I would be facing blindness in from five to eight years. One eye already removed and a great surgeon trying to save the other. In May of this year it was decided to operate, the result being perfect 100% vision.

This is like starting life over again. The drive of ambition and incentive to progress has returned with the vision. I can now face these men on even terms. The next move is theirs and I am ready and eager to do battle. If I could advance in my dark years a little, this is not a time for retreat. It is my belief your decision to print this report could be the nucleus of a more realistic and rational approach to solving similar problems.

In the near future I am laying plans for an extension of Rosslake. An airport, with 2,000 foot landing strip and 500 foot crosswind strip. Adjacent to this will be a strip of land for a golf practice or driving range of about 8 holes. Later on after the crops are harvested, I will probably have a more complete plan about this, and if a write-up has any merit concerning its development, perhaps it could be published. I believe this extension of our facilities here has potential, not only to accommodate flying tourists, but a growing local interest in small craft.
