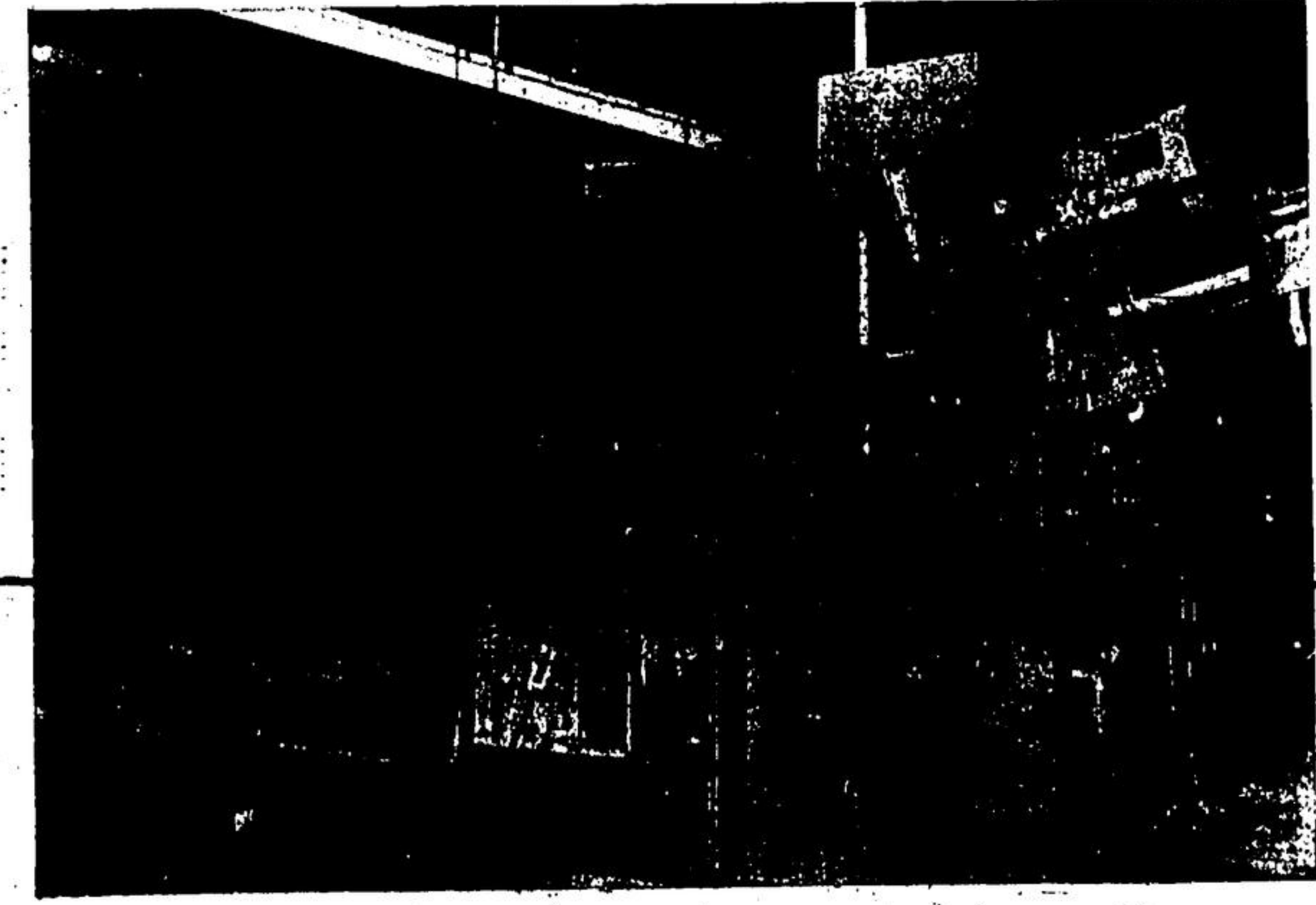

Goldup Plastics, owned by Ted Goldup, son of ex-NHL great Hank Goldup, is the first occupant of the industrial mall on Todd Road.

Custom injection moulding is done on a fully automated machine. At present it is by itself, but eventually, rows of them are seen in the owner's eyes.

Even now after only three weeks in business the plant is operating on three shifts. Five employees are there at present, but this, too soon will grow.
