Figures released by the Georgetown & District Memorial Hospital this week indicate the regular seasonal dip in occupancy may not occur this summer. The figures which cover the hospital's operation for the month of June show a 93.8 per cent, much higher than normal for this time of year.

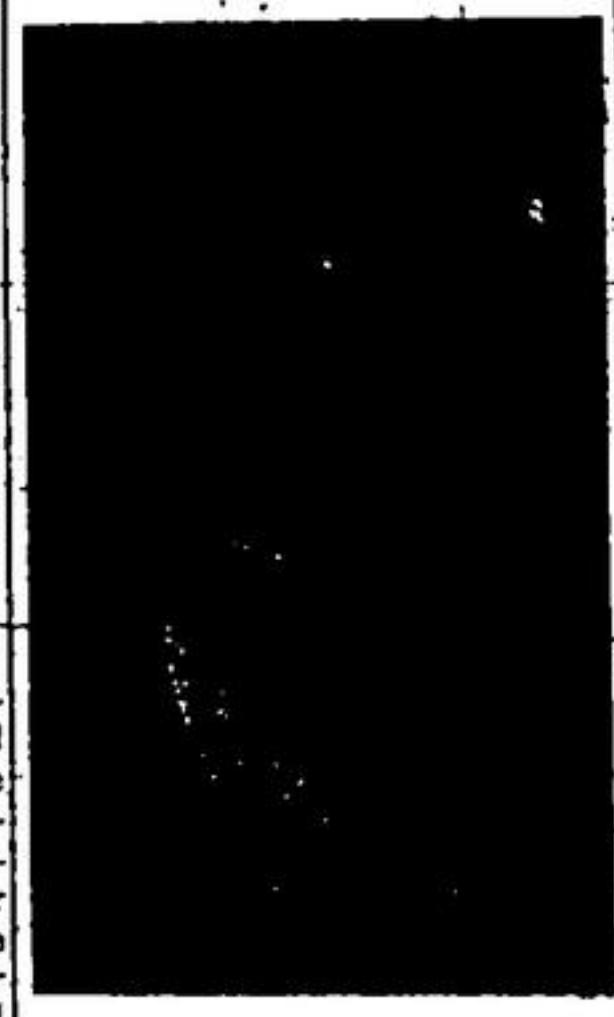
The report states that there were days during the month when the Medical and Surgical floors have been full to capacity resulting in the high occupancy rate.

In contrast the maternity ward rate of occupancy in June was 41 per cent, and children's ward 50 per cent.

One of his biggest jobs will be to hold a district conference of all Rotary Clubs in this area. The conference will be held March 21, 22, 23, 1969 at the Inn on the Park, Toronto.

Three Weeks With Indians In 'Y' Leadership Program

A grade 12 student, Jan Laforet, 39 Sargent Rd., has just returned from a three week stay on Indian reservations as part of a 'Y' sponsored leadership training group.

The first week was spent at Wikimikong, Manitoulin Island, an Ojibway reservation. The 24 girls from all over Canada were made up of eight Indian girls and sixteen non-Indian.

The first week was spent learning the differences in the two cultures, and practicing setting up a program to appeal to all age groups. The Indian girls returned to go back to their own reservations and set up their own recreation programs.

Much to Jan's surprise, when she reached Cutler, near Espanola, she found herself teaching the Indians beadwork. "They don't seem to know much about their own culture," said Jan. "We are trying to get them interested and proud of their own heritage."

She saw no starvation, but very few comforts. All the girls had their "values shook up," says Jan. "Things we think are necessities, down here, we found are not only unnecessary but unwanted up there."

The Georgetown girl admitted none of the girls wanted to leave the reservation when time was up. "We became so involved with the people, particularly the children," she added.

Following the three weeks up north, the girls came to Toronto primarily to show the Indian girls city life and let them draw their own conclusions.
