Jan, regularly a Bramalea Excelsior junior, has been called up by Montreal to play out the balance of the regular schedule in the pro ranks and has already made his presence felt in games against Detroit Olympics, Toronto Maple Leafs and Victoria Shamrocks.

He'll also be in the lineup and used regularly against Detroit tonight, and Toronto in Montreal on Friday, before returning to the juniors for the playoffs.

"With no off-ice and very few facemasks lacrosse is more strenuous than hockey," Jan, a former Junior A hockey player, told The Herald. "And with the new 30 second rule which discourages a team from playing possessive lacrosse and not shooting it makes good physical condition even more important," he said.

and son Landry arrived with a fish net, captured the Texas pin cushion and whisked it out of town where they let it ample to the security of pines and maples.

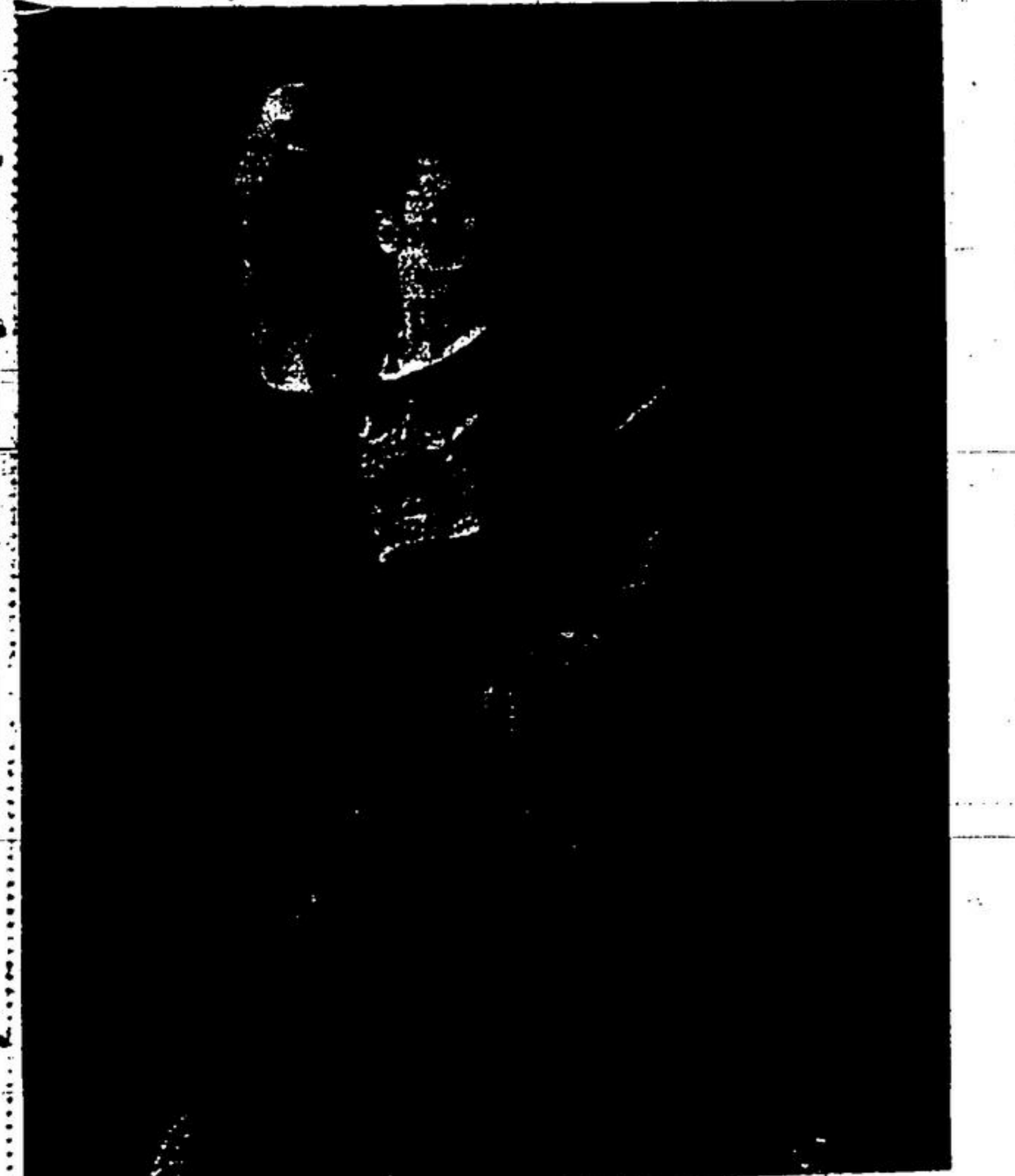

No Sunday Racing North Halton Track

Lt. Gov. W. Ross MacDonald gave Royal assent two weeks ago to an amendment to the Lord's Day Act which allows municipal councils to approve Sunday racing.

Immediately after the assent the Jockey Club Ltd. announced the horses with paratubal betting would be off Sunday at Fort Erie.

North Halton, in which Fort Erie is located, passed the Sunday racing by-law two weeks ago by a vote of three to two.

Nassagaweya Township council would have to okay Sunday racing at Mohawk which is located at Campbellville.
