Hon. George Brown, of course, was one of the fathers of Confederation and the lacrosse players are supposed to signify our national sport.

The association's efforts have drawn high praise from William Stewart, Ontario's minister of agriculture and food.

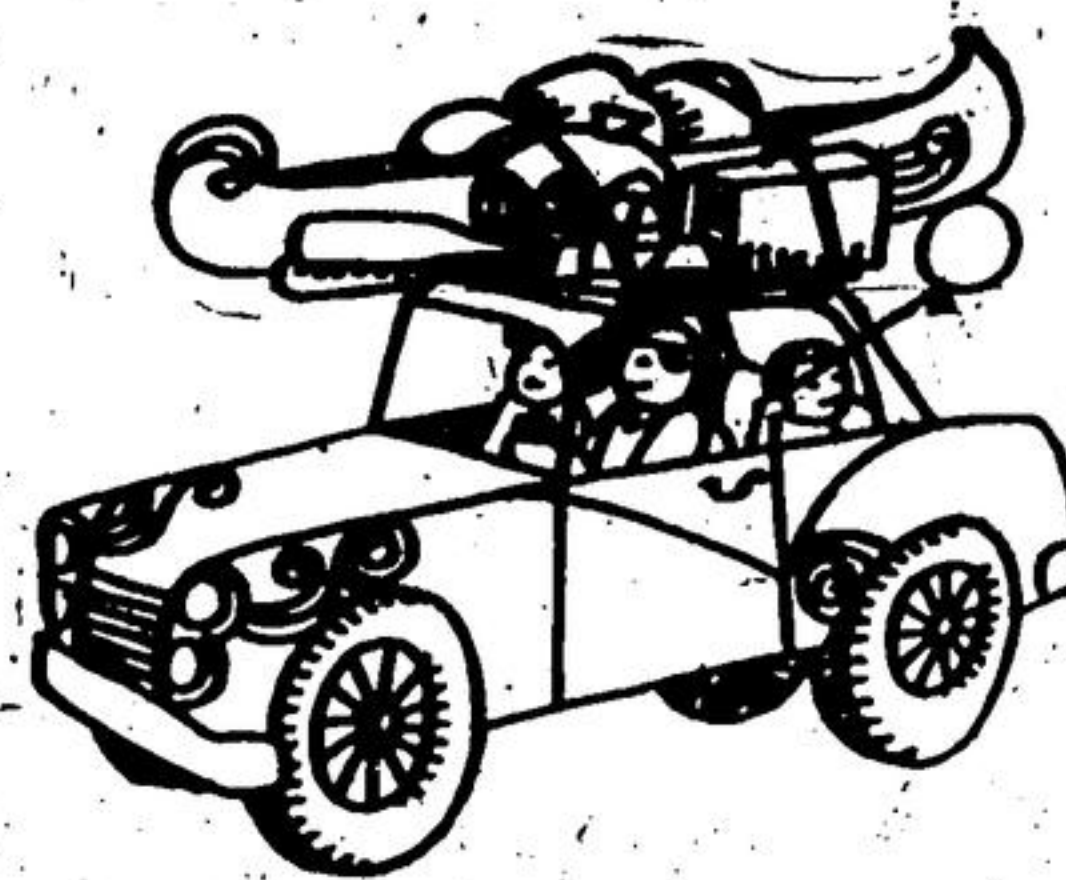
"The members are deserving of very strong commendation for their efforts in presenting the eighth annual 'steam era' at Milton on Labour Day weekend," he said.

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Plan Many Changes For Halton Jail

The Halton County Jail which is now operating without a governor is a "God awful situation" according to Dr. Morton Shufman, NDP member at Queen's Park.

It was announced by the minister of reform institutions Al Ian Grossman that the governor of the century old jail, Glen Ryder has requested to be put on sick leave pending his retirement late this summer.

Grossman announced a 10 point plan to renovate the jail building which has come under constant criticism from the grand juries who tour the building regularly, and report their findings to the county judge.

The criticism ranges from lack of recreation and exercise facilities to lack of modern toilets.

Among the changes that Grossman announced — which followed a two-month investigation of the situation — were plans to hire a new chef, paint the building, provide a larger staff and change some of the administrative duties and visiting privileges.

The latest incident at the jail involved a prisoner who was found beaten and bleeding in his cell by the one guard on duty for the whole building. Other inmates had beaten him in the corridors and warned him not to tell the guard or he would be beaten again.

Two of the inmates involved were last week sentenced to three more months in jail for the beating.

A government inspector will run the jail until a new governor is chosen to replace Ryder. Ryder was criticized by county council about two years ago after a prisoner hacked his way through the bar on his window and escaped. Just a few weeks after Ryder was called before council another prisoner escaped by forcing apart the bars on his window with a broken off steam pipe.

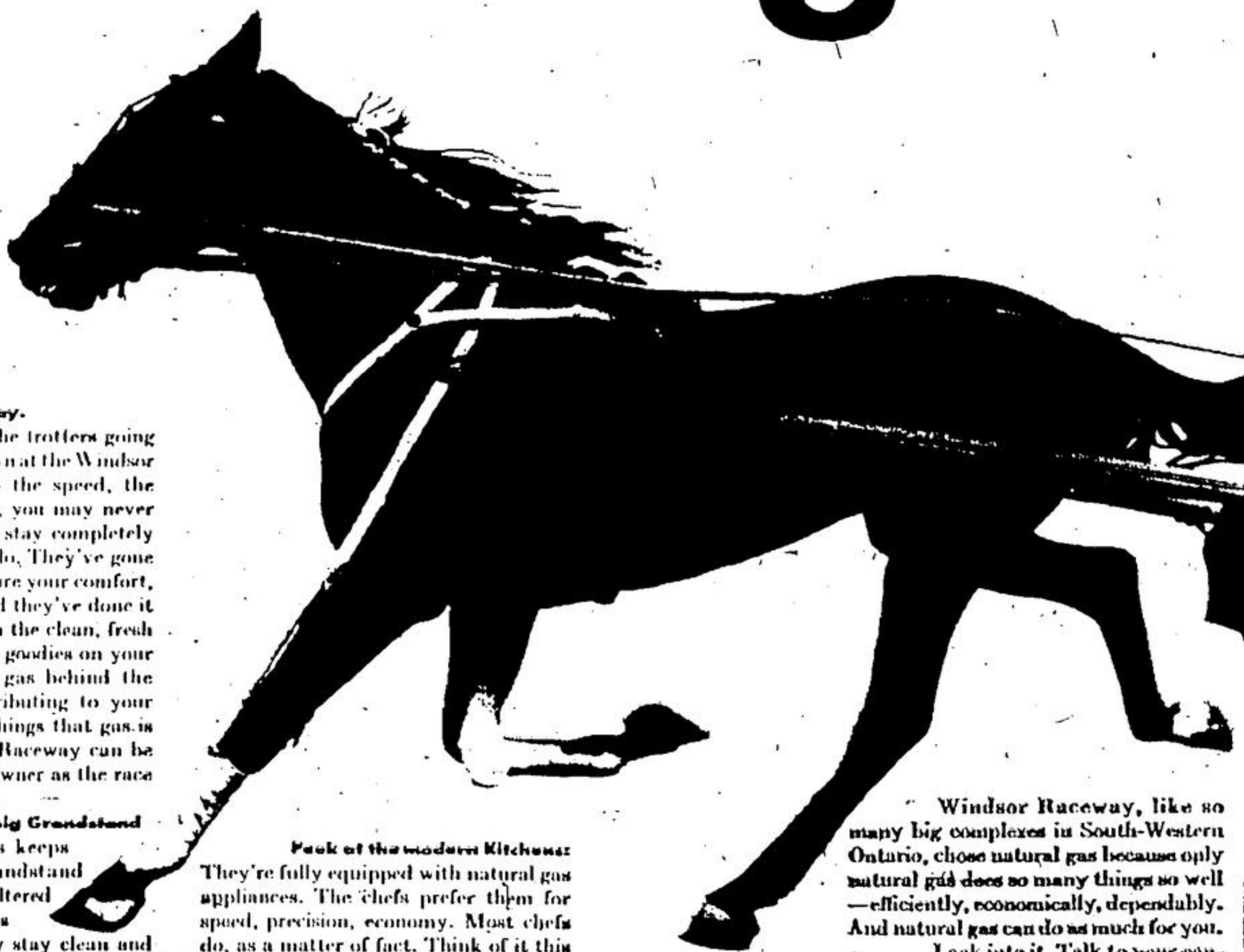
