Legion - Sponsored Air Cadets Ready To Go In September

Georgetown is to have its own Air Cadet Squadron and most of the preliminary work has been completed. No. 756 Squadron Royal Canadian (A/R). Cadets has its headquarters set up at Cedarvale Centennial Community Centre, thanks to the cooperation of the Centre's committee. As well as an auditorium for drill, there is a lecture room, orderly room and supply office. Capt. A. R. (Rod) Macdonald will command the Squadron. His personal Administrative Officer is Lt. Col. Colin Cousens; supply officer Lt. Frank Bull; chief instructor Capt. Groszkorth. The Squadron which is ready to take off at any time is being sponsored by Branch 120, Royal Canadian Legion. A sponsoring committee has been appointed by the Legion to act as liaison officers to link up the two organizations. Ralph Hawes, the committee chairman is responsible for accommodation, seeing that adequate financing is provided; and he will cooperate with the Squadron Commander in selecting Air Cadets for Scholarships, exchange visits, etc. Bob Mackenzie, the committee secretary will also be kept busy organizing visits, etc. Russell Stephens, treasurer, as well as keeping the financial books will provide means to raise money to help sponsor the cadets. He will work with 2nd Lt. Bull on supplies. Capt. McDonald is liaison officer with the RCAF. It is his responsibility to see that the Squadron operates successfully. Lt. Cousens, the squadron adjutant will assist the commanding officer in the administration and training of the cadets. 2nd Lt. Bull will be in charge of the supplies, of which there are many. Lt. Groszkorth will draw up the training and lecture syllabus, from September until May. He will be in charge of civilian instructors. Two air cadets from Guelph Squadron who have transferred to the new squadron in Georgetown have just completed a two-week Senior NCO's course — Cpl. Brian Seeler and Cpl. D.

Set \$10,000 Price for Ashgrove Church Property

Halton County Council may have to pay \$10,000 to recover a 17 by 100 foot strip of road allowance crossing the front of Ashgrove United Church on the Seventh Line. Since the road was reconstructed three years ago, the front of the church is so close to the road that cars splash the doors on wet days. The offer, made by the Halton County roads committee, and yet to be approved by county council — also includes a clause insisting that the building be moved back from the road. The church elders accepted the offer. The congregation of Ashgrove Church, now amalgamated with Hornby United Church, is not concerned with the future of the church property and building as the combined congregations intend to build a new house of worship on the 7th Line, south of Ashgrove. It is understood that during the negotiations the church elders offered the property and the church to the county for \$15,000. The county, not having a use for the property or the building, refused the offer.

Lengthy Illness Fatal For Jenny McNally

She died in Georgetown hospital on the previous Saturday after a serious illness.
