# Assessment Jump Worries Farmers About The Future

The property committee of the Halton Federation of Agriculture, under the chairmanship of Harold Middlebrook, met at the Agricultural Office, Milton, to discuss the new assessment of farm land.

Farmers throughout Halton have been greatly worried about the increase of up to three times or more the present assessment on their land. Many question the future of farming in this county because of the taxes which now are much higher than in most other counties in the province, and are scheduled to go up much higher for 1960.

The Halton Federation of Agriculture will be calling three meetings throughout Halton in September. The meetings will be well advertised and all farmers are invited. A lawyer will be engaged to advise farmers on assessment appeals. If legislative action against increased land assessment is desired, it can also be discussed at this time.

**51 4-Hers Compete Judge Seeds and Land**  
Fifty one 4H and Junior Farmer members from Halton County participated in the first Halton-Peel Land and Seed Judging competition held at the Terra Cotta Conservation Area.
