

Renovations Started on Century-Old County Jail

The long-awaited renovation of Halton's century-old county jail has finally started.

Offices and corridors are being repainted, and new tables are being installed in the corridors. New security screens for the windows are being made, and will be installed shortly.

The property room, where belongings of prisoners are kept during their terms of incarceration, is being thoroughly renovated, and new facilities will be installed. New floor tile will be laid in the offices.

"We are making a few administrative changes," said Inspector Stanley Taggart. "We are converting to the provincial system of book-keeping. We have taken a new chef on the staff and have added kitchen equipment to maintain good quality and variety of meals."

O. P. P. WEEKLY REPORT

During the week of Aug. 4 to 10, officers of Milton detachment, Ontario Provincial Police, investigated 2 complaints of damage to property, 2 complaints of trespassing, 2 break and enter — one of which proved to be unfounded — one complaint of threatening, 1 theft, in Exquisite Twp. in which approximately \$800 worth of tools were stolen, 3 liquor investigations resulting in three persons being charged, 1 person charged under the Motor Vehicle Accident Claims Act, 1 car stolen in this area and recovered, and two cars reported recovered for other forces.

A total of 16 accidents were investigated including 7 personal injury accidents resulting in 12 persons being injured and 9 property damage accidents. Total property damage for the week was \$8,061.00. Causes of accidents were Careless Driving, Fail to Yield Right of Way, Driving on Wrong Side of Road, Fail to Stop, Speed to Fast, a car running away. There were 8 charges laid as a result of these accidents.

During this period officers, patrolled 9,880 miles and worked a total of 9 1/2 hours. 52 charges were laid and 66 traffic warnings issued. There were 90 vehicles safety checked.

The Following Transportation Schedule:

ROUTE 1: West on Hwy. 7 to 7th Line (7.45 a.m.) South on 7th Line to 17 Side Road — West on 17 Side Road to 4th Line, South on 4th Line to 15 Side Road — East on 15 Side Road to 7th Line; south on 7th Line to 10 Side Road — East on 10 Side Road to 8th Line — North on 8th Line to School (8.25 a.m.)

ROUTE 2: At 7.45 a.m. East on 20 Side Road to 10th Line; South on 10th Line to 17 Side Road; East on 17 Side Road to Town Line; South on Town Line to Norval Station; North on Town Line to Terra Cotta; leave Terra Cotta (8.05 a.m.) West on 27 Side Road to 10th Line; South on 10th Line to 22 Side Road; through Glen Williams at 8.20 a.m. to school.

ROUTE 3: South on 9th Line to Glen Williams, leaving the Glen at 8.20 a.m. to School.

ROUTE 4: East on Hwy. 7 to Norval; South on Town Line to Lot No. 9; North on Town Line to 10 Side Road; West on 10 Side Road to 9th Line; East to Norval at 8.35 a.m.; West on Highway 7 to School.

ROUTE 5: 2 Buses leave B.A. Station, East Georgetown; West to School at 8.40 a.m.

ROUTE 6: North on 8th Line to 22 Side Road, 8.10 a.m. — West on 22 Side Road to Highway 7 — South on Highway 7 to School.

Students will go directly to the classroom assigned to them according to the lists posted in the entrance foyer for Grades 9 and 11 and on the Gym corridor wall for Grades 10, 12 and 13. Students not on these lists will report to the library.

All Grade Nine, Ten, Eleven and Twelve Text Books will be provided by the High School Board. A STUDENT LOSING OR DAMAGING ANY OF THESE BOOKS WILL BE ASSESSED FOR THIS LOSS OR DAMAGE. Students owing the school for books damaged or lost during the past school year must pay for these before registering. All books provided will be collected after the examinations next June, or when a student leaves this school. To protect these books from loss, lockers will be assigned to each student by the teacher in charge of the classroom. Combination locks will be on sale in the girls' gym at \$1.25 each for those students requiring them.

This year it will again be necessary to run three lunch periods. The first lunch period will be from 11.25 to 12.10, second lunch period from 12.10 to 12.55 and the third lunch period from 12.55 to 1.40. Approximately one third of the classes will go to lunch at a time, and the remaining two thirds will remain in class. This means that regular classes will be going on all day. The school will finish regular classes at 3.10 and the buses will leave at 3.45. The lunch period for an individual class may vary from day to day depending on the timetable.

This year we will again use the Six Day Cycle. This means it will take six days to complete the 42 periods rather than the five days as previous. The timetable will show Day 1, Day 2, etc. to Day 6. These days will not conform to the week days but will vary from week to week. This is an advantage in that the periods will be longer, each period being 45 minutes long, but there will only be seven teaching periods a day, so that the total teaching time will be the same as before.
